## SUDDEN DEATH OF PIONEER OF ST. JOHN DRY DOCK PROJECT

George Robertson, Deputy Receiver General, ex-Mayor of St. John and Promoter of Imperial Dry Dock Company, Passed Away Yesterday Afternoon.

In the death of George Robertson, which occurred about four o'clock yesterday afternoon, St. John lost one of its best known citizens. Although Mr. Robertson had been in poor health for some time his death was unexpected and came as a great shock to his relatives and friends. The news of his passing spread quickly about the city, and was received on all sides with expressions of heartfelt regret.  
Besides his wife, Mr. Robertson leaves three sons and three daughters, the sons being William, Inspector of the Bank of Ottawa; Duncan, in the employ of the Q. T. P., at Edmonton; and George in Calgary, and the daughters being Mrs. J. Montgomery, Miss Jennie and Miss Ethel of St. John. He is also survived by three sisters, Mrs. S. A. Corbett, of St. John; Mrs. David Blackwood, of Halifax; and Miss Magie Robertson, of Halifax, and by five brothers, Struan Robertson of St. John, Clare of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Windsor, Alexander of Vancouver; John, Fernie, B. C.; and William J., of New York.

A Public Spirited Man.  
Mr. Robertson was one of the most public spirited citizens of St. John, always ready to give his service to the good of the city, and always optimistic about the future of the city. Prior to accepting the position of manager and deputy receiver of the Dominion Savings Bank, here he took a prominent part in public affairs, and held a number of public offices in the gift of the people.

He was a man of fine character and sterling honesty, and had a wide reputation as a public speaker. While president of the Board of Trade he was a strong advocate of the policy of making St. John a great dry dock, and was the promoter and director of the Imperial Dry Dock Company of St. John, and his work done much to forward the plans under which the federal government are now building a great dry dock here. While actively engaged in business Mr. Robertson carried on an extensive trade with the West Indies and was well known in the shipping world. He was also the winter port business. He also believed that St. John was the natural location for a great dry dock, and was the promoter and director of the Imperial Dry Dock Company of St. John, and his work done much to forward the plans under which the federal government are now building a great dry dock here.

Mr. Robertson was born in Kingston, Ontario, Canada, on Jan. 1, 1854. His father, the late Duncan Robertson, was born in 1822, in Aberdeen, Scotland, and after coming to New Brunswick he was a successful shipbuilder at Kingston, Moncton and Cocagne.

George Robertson received his early education in Moncton, and later at the University of New Brunswick.

Mr. Robertson was married in 1881, to Miss Mary Ann Robertson, daughter of the late William Turner, of St. John. He had seven children, one of whom died in infancy.

Although he had been in ill health for some months his death yesterday was very sudden and unexpected. He had not been confined to bed and shortly before four o'clock he became weak and passed away very quietly. He will be held in state in the parlour of his home, 254 Princess street.

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## JORDAN SANITORIUM A FINE INSTITUTION

Commissioners Leaving Nothing Undone to Make Tuberculosis Sanatorium Up to Date in Every Way.

A meeting of the commissioners of the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium was held in the government rooms on Church street last evening, those present being Premier Fleming, Hon. C. W. Robinson, F. W. Sumner, Dr. A. P. MacKenney, Hon. Dr. Lawry and the secretary, Dr. David Townsend. The principal question discussed was that of installing a sewer system, which would prevent the pollution of the neighboring stream. Dr. Townsend reported that two of the pavilions were practically completed, and that good progress was being made on the other. A water tower is to be erected to provide fire protection for the institution, and it is planned to construct a new road leading direct from the river and create an artificial lake near the buildings.

It is hoped that the institution will be ready to receive patients by the end of the year. When completed it will be a credit to its founder and the province.

Palmer came up for postponement of the trial from the October circuit, on the ground of the absence of a necessary and material witness, Ernest Lichtenburg, who is in London. V. B. Chellier, K. C., supported the application for postponement; E. A. Kelly, on behalf of the bank, opposed the application, contending that there was ample time from the service of the replies to the notice of the trial to obtain his evidence, either by the presence of the witness or taking it under commission. His Honor granted the postponement with costs for the plaintiff against the defendant.

Like application in the matter of the Bank of New Brunswick vs. McAuley was also allowed.

## SAYS KINGS COUNTY MAN IS INNOCENT

Remarkable Letter May Free from Guilt Man Held in Maine Prison—Conspiracy Alleged

Augusta, Me., Oct. 18.—The following remarkable letter will play a part in the hearing today before the governor and council on the petition of Wm. H. Eldridge, of Annapolis, N. B., for a pardon:  
"Howland, Maine, July 5, 1911.—To Wm. H. Eldridge: I will write you a few lines. I am sick, and the doctor says that I can't get well again, so I will say that you are not guilty of the crime which you are in prison for. I was hired to help put up job on you to get you out of town. I did not lose my money at all, but they got me to swear that you robbed me of \$35. I am sorry for you, but I hope that you will not hold a bad feeling against me. I ask you to forgive me for doing this wrong thing. I will say that you ought to be let out to go home to your family. Well, I have told you all, I ask you to forgive me. You know that I am the one who sent you there. (Signed) Mrs. Ellen Lee, Howland, Maine."  
Mrs. Lee died later in the month, a short time after the letter was written. Eldridge has served two years and eight months of a four year sentence in the state prison on a charge of robbing Mrs. Lee of \$35 at the point of a rifle, Oct. 21, 1909.

The petition is signed by W. H. McKay, and 43 other residents of Edinburg and Passabumbeag. Eldridge has a wife and children living in destitute circumstances in Annapolis, N. B.
