CARGO VALUATIONS

The Allan Line steamer Corinthian
for London and Havre took away Can-
adian goods valued at \$204,553, and
foreign goods valued at \$36,353, mak-
ing a total valuation of \$240,906.
The Allan Line steamer Victorian
for Liverpool took away Canadian
goods valued at \$47,776, and foreign
goods valued at \$88,724, making a to-
tal of \$136,500. Her wheat shipments
are 1,627 bushels.

COMPLETED WINTER CRUISING

Steamer Governor Cobb has com-
pleted her winter cruising season be-
tween Key West and Havana, and
sailed from the Florida port on Thurs-
day for Boston, where she will haul
out for her usual spring cleaning be-
fore resuming her service on the in-
ternational division of the Eastern
Steamship Corporation. This is the
fifth winter season the Cobb has been
engaged on the route above men-
tioned and she has become a great favorite
with the travelling public.

DANGERS TO NAVIGATION.

New York, April 18.—Str Caribbean
reports April 14, lat 23 N, lon 72 W,
passed a ship's boat about 20 feet
long bottom up, painted white.
Sir Harlewood reports April 15,
from Bodley Island almost to Cape
Henry and about 10 miles off shore
passed a quantity of small wreckage.
Sir Leda (Ger) reports April 11, lat
24 15 N, lon 74 W, passed a broken
mast standing upright and projecting
about 10 feet out of water, apparently
attached to submerged wreckage.

GIFTS FOR CREW.

New York, April 18.—The Life Sav-
ing Benevolent Association of New
York, W. Irving Combs, president, de-
livered today to Paul Paget, repre-
sentative of the French Line, on be-
half of Captain Cassin, officers and
crew of the French Liner Touraine,
two gold and four silver medals,
twenty-eight bronze pins and \$365 in
gold in recognition of their rescue of
59 persons from the steamer Volturo
on fire in mid-ocean in October, 1913.
The medals and money will be for-
warded to France, as the Touraine
is about to take her place for the sum-
mer season on the French Line's
Havre-Canada service.

OPENING NEW SERVICE

Shipping Illustrated: On Friday,
April 24, the Allan Line steamer Sic-
ilian opens the 1914 Plymouth to Cana-
da service. Three years ago the port
of Plymouth was selected by Mr.
Hugh Allan, the enterprising chair-
man of the Allan Line, as the English
channel port of call for some of the
steamers engaged in the company's
London service. The adoption of this
historic port for the departure of the
south and west of England people
bound for Canada affords the longest
possible time for making final prepa-
rations, and saves a day or two for
those who would otherwise have join-
ed the vessel in London.

JOURNALISM IN ONTARIO

Journalism in what is now the Province
of Ontario had its beginning 71
years ago, April 18, 1793, when
the initial number of the Upper Cana-
da Gazette or American Oracle, was
issued at Newark, afterward Niagara,
the first capital of Upper Canada.
The Ontario Gazette, the first news-
paper in the Dominion of the future
had been found forty years before
and Quebec and Montreal Journalism
was also firmly established before the
pioneer organ of enlightenment in the
Upper Province by Maj-Gen. J. Graves
Simcoe, the first Lieutenant Governor,
although his choice had at first in-
clined toward a site now occupied by
the city of London. The first assem-
bly was convened at Newark seven
months before the first journal was
printed. The plan for the publica-
tion of the "Gazette and Oracle" in-
cluded a news hand-press and a for-
case of type, and the printer was Louis
Ray, a Frenchman, whose knowledge
of the English language left much to
be desired. It was an official publi-
cation and was confined largely to
proclamations and advertisements,
with news a mere incident. When the
capital was removed to York, after-
ward Toronto, which was founded in
1794, the newspaper went with it and
became the York Gazette. For many
years it held the field, and its early
rivals had brief lives. A large por-
tion of the early papers of Canada
and the Maritime Provinces, like those
of the Colonies to the South, bore the
name of Gazette, and Oracle was also
a popular journalistic title in these
days, and the founder of Ontario's
first journal combined the two by add-
ing a sub-head, which was also a gen-
eral practice in those days.

Amherst Man Arrested
A telegram was received by Chief
Clark at police headquarters yester-
day from Chief of Police Carter of Am-
herst, Quebec, that Hugh Stewart, aged
eighteen years, was arrested. The
case was given to Detective Killen and
yesterday afternoon about 2.30 o'clock
he managed to make the arrest and
the young man was placed in a cen-
tral station cell. An officer will ar-
rive in the city this morning from
Amherst with a warrant and will take
his prisoner back to the Nova Scotia
town. It was not stated at central
station last night what Stewart was
wanted for.
