DISCUSS THE WAR

PREMIER BORDEN BACK TO CAPITAL THIS MORNING---CABINET WILL MEET TO TALK OVER PLANS IN EVENT OF CALL COMING FOR ASSISTANCE.

Canada will be Guarded by Advice from Motherland and not Definitely known whether Organized Troops or Volunteer Regiments willbe Sent to Empire's Aid.

Special to The Standard.

Ottawa, July 31.—With all the great powers apparently sliding by an uncontrollable fate into the fiercest and most terrific conflict that Europe has ever witnessed there is the most tense interest here in the hourly developments.

The announcement of actual war on the part of Russia and Germany is awaited as the signal of Britain's participation also since this would mean the taking of immediate steps here for the mobilization of a contingent to leave Canada's shores the moment the word comes from the Imperial government. The Prime Minister, Sir Robert Borden, will be back here from Muskoka tomorrow morning and Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes will also be here. A cabinet meeting has been called for eleven o'clock in the morning and the war situation as it has then developed will be discussed.

While Canada will doubtless be guided by advice from the British authorities, there is no doubt that the support from Canada will be enthusiastically given.

There has been no decision yet of course whether any troops that may be sent will be organized, or volunteer regiments, or whether some of the present militia regiments will be ordered out as the Governor General has power to do at the same time calling for an immediate session of parliament.

While some are disposed to consider the delay in the actual outbreak of war between Russia, Germany and the other powers, a cause of hope, this is looked upon in military circles as only a matter of sparring for time on the part of Austria and Germany. It is agreed that delay is a great advantage to Germany, which when it strikes will strike very suddenly. The question of preventing the Austrians and Germans in Canada from going home to fight for their countries has not been discussed here officially, but it may be.

Not all of the Austrians and Germans will go back, as some feel their obligations here too strong, but there will probably be over ten thousand returning. Many go down through the United States. Nothing could be done to prevent them going of cour
