

THE CHARGES ALL BY P. J. VENIOT

John Bridge said that the two-
potholes Chasson, showed him
drawn timber mentioned above
of the Bridge. He seems
know nothing about this mat-
ter, and simply signed a receipt
for the timber. He is not
Martin Robichaud without re-
viewing whether it was or was
not.

Robichaud really knew
at all about this transaction,
as he has told entirely upon
the P. J. Robichaud and the fore-
man Chasson, who was left
of the work.

Understand that the Structural
Superintendent for the
Dempsey Bridge, had no knowl-
edge of Frank Robichaud's
actual amount expended in
was nearly \$3,000.

Evidence given before me in
connection with the enquiries held
that so far as Valentine Robichaud
Structural Superintendent, in-
ed, he did not know very much
the work supposed to be car-
ried out under his supervision,
entirely upon either Mr. A. J.
Stewart or Mr. Martin F. Robi-
chaud, practically took after the
work, and make up his re-
ports.

In the cases into which I have en-
quired, where Valentine Robichaud
acted, proved him to be in-
competent and unsatisfactory, and com-
mended under the control of the Com-
missioners, Messrs. Stewart
and Chasson.

Robichaud had supplied any posts to
the Dempsey Bridge; Frank Robi-
chaud knew nothing about the matter
himself nor did Valentine Robichaud
and Mr. Stewart himself could not ex-
plain the item.

The amount is small but it only goes
to show the wretched system under
which the work done under Valentine
Robichaud was conducted, and the un-
fortunate result of interference by a
representative with matters that
should be left, in my judgment, to be
dealt with by the Department of Pub-
lic Works.

Edmond J. Ellis, the foreman at the
Dempsey Bridge, had no knowledge
of Frank Robichaud's supplying any ce-
lar posts to that Bridge, but we find
this item in connection with this
Bridge in Valentine Robichaud's re-
turn and declared by him to be cor-
rect.

This return was declared to before
Mr. Stewart, and the voucher for these
posts made out by Mr. Stewart and
signed by Robichaud; but neither of
these persons can now give the slight-
est information with regard to this
item.

It is clear that the item is wholly
fictitious, but why it was put in and
got the amount charged for the posts
remains to be discovered.

LITTLE BUCTOUCHE BRIDGE,
Parish of Wellington, Kent County,
N. B.

The charge in this matter is that
certain accounts appearing in the re-
turns for this Bridge for the years
1910 and 1911 were supposed to have
been done by John K. Sheridan and
John Sheridan, Jr., are wrong. Also,
that work appearing on the return as
having been done by Fabien Savoy to
the amount of fifteen dollars was never
performed by him. Also that an
amount credited to John K. Sheridan
as foreman on this Bridge in the year
1914 is incorrect as John K. Sheridan
really did not act as foreman.

In the return in connection with this
bridge for October, 1910, Fabien Savoy
is down for fourteen days' work at
\$1.25, amounting to \$17.50. Timothy
Boudreau, who was foreman at this
bridge, on being examined admitted
that this work was not done by Fa-
bien Savoy and that this amount was
simply put in the return for the benefit
of Mr. John Sheridan, who was then
a representative for the County of
Kent. The foreman says he wanted
to help Mr. Sheridan all he could. That
Mr. Sheridan had done some work and
connection with this bridge and had
devoted some time to the work and
while he did not wish to put Mr. Sheri-
dan's name down in the return he did
put in Fabien Savoy's name for this
amount of \$17.50 in order to make
Mr. Sheridan's return what he had
done.

There are also items in the return
in connection with this bridge in the
name of John K. Sheridan, a representative
of Mr. Sheridan, the representative.
Timothy Boudreau, the foreman, ad-
mitted that forty dollars out of the ac-
counts appearing to the credit of
John K. Sheridan was not really earned
by him and that he did no work for
this amount. This amount of forty dol-
lars was put in by the foreman for the
benefit of Mr. Sheridan, the repre-
sentative.

Had Done Much Work For Nothing
The foreman explained that he had
himself done a good deal of work in
looking after this bridge at night and
keeping lanterns lit, and that he had
done this work for nothing. The foreman
claims that he practically acted as
night watchman for nearly five months
on this temporary bridge and charged
nothing for his services. He says that
if he had employed a foreman he would
have had to pay him at least one
dollar per night. Being anxious
to do something for Mr. Sheridan, the
representative, the foreman added various
amounts making up forty dollars in
all for the benefit of Mr. Sheridan,
the representative, and I presume he
eventually got this money.

In the return for May, 1914, in con-
nection with this bridge, John K. Sheri-
dan's name appears as foreman.
John K. Sheridan is a young man,
who was not then of age, and he really
did not act as foreman at all; the
work did not take long and only four
or five men were employed.

John K. Sheridan worked about
eleven days on this bridge in May,
1914, and was paid two dollars a day,
and I presume he was put down as
foreman for much the same reason as
was given by the foreman, Timothy
Boudreau, in connection with the other
matters mentioned above; namely,
a desire to do something to help Mr.
Sheridan, the representative, and to
remunerate him for the time he had
devoted to looking after this bridge.
The amount credited to John K. Sheri-
dan for his work was eventually paid
to his father.

It is regrettable that Mr. Sheridan,
while a representative for the County
of Kent lent himself to this sort of
thing, and took money which he did
not really earn. If Mr. Sheridan wish-
ed to get some money in connection
with the work on this bridge it would
have been very much better if his
name had appeared on the pay-roll for
the work he did. This whole matter was
irregular and conduct of this kind can
only result in the degradation of the
public service and of those who take
part in such transactions.

**MacLean Settlement
BRIDGE,**
Parish of St. Paul, Kent County, N. B.

The charge in this matter is that a
cheque was issued to a son of Edward
Girouard, of MacLean Settlement,
Kent Co., N. B., in 1911 for work on
the Bridge named above.

That the son who was only two years
old never worked on the bridge. The
son's name was endorsed on the
cheque and the father, Edward Girou-
ard, received the proceeds of the cheque.

The cheque in question was dated
November 28th, 1911, for \$28.87. The
cheque was supposed to be issued to pay
Timon Girouard for work done on the
MacLean Settlement Bridge in the
month of August, 1911, according to
the return sent in with respect to the
work on the MacLean Settlement
Bridge in 1911.

Edward Girouard and his son, Al-
ban, worked on the MacLean Settle-
ment Bridge in the summer of 1911
and cheques were issued from time to
time in payment for their work. Ac-
cording to the evidence of Edward Gi-
rouard this cheque in favor of Timon
Girouard was produced to him by
Mr. Felix Michaud, of Buctouche,
about the sixth day of December, 1911,
when Edward Girouard went to see
Felix Michaud about his own cheque
and cheques for his son Alban for
work done on the MacLean Settlement
Bridge. Mr. Michaud produced some
cheques, two of them in favor of Ed-
ward Girouard himself and two in fa-
vor of Alban Girouard. These particu-
lar cheques were endorsed, Edward
Girouard endorsing the name of his
son Alban. There was also at this
time produced by Mr. Michaud a
cheque for \$28.87 in favor of Timon
Girouard. According to Edward Gi-
rouard's evidence, when this cheque
in favor of Timon Girouard was pro-
duced by Mr. Michaud, he, Girouard,
claimed that there must be a mistake
about the cheque as it did not belong
to him.

Girouard says that Mr. Michaud told
him to keep it as it was for him, and
said, "Put the name of the boy on the
back and I will cash you that
cheque," and finally Edward Girouard
tried to write the name of his son
Timon on the back of the cheque and
was unable to do so. Felix Michaud
then took the cheque and wrote the
name of Timon Girouard on the back
and told Edward Girouard to write
his name on the back of the cheque.
Below that of his son, Edward Girou-
ard did this and the cheque was then
cashied by Mr. Michaud and the money
given to Edward Girouard and at the
time the examination the money was
still in the possession of Ed-
ward Girouard.

The Girouard Case
Edward Girouard claims that when
the cheque payable to Timon was of-
fered to him by Mr. Michaud he said
that the cheque did not belong to him
and that there must be some mistake
about it as his son Timon had not
worked on the MacLean Settlement
Bridge. It seems to be admitted by all
concerned that Timon Girouard never
did work on the MacLean Settlement
Bridge and was not entitled to
anything in connection with the work
on this bridge.

Mr. Michaud's explanation of the
matter is that in September, 1911, Ed-
ward Girouard told him that some
time which he had not been taken away
Some of this lumber was used this
River Bridge and St. Simon Bridge.
This lumber would be available for
any purpose. Lumber did not use
lumber as it was too far away. This
lumber is all paid for except possibly
sixty pieces. We estimated that
5,400 pieces would be required in Ro-
bichaud's district for bridges and or-
dered 5,435 pieces. I distributed the
