## BRAVE WOMEN

The following special Order of the Day was issued by General Sir Douglas Haig, in January, 1917:

British Headquarters, France.  
The Commander-in-Chief desires to bring to the notice of the troops the following incident, which is illustrative of the spirit animating British women who are working with us for the common cause. One night recently a shell burst in a shop at a filling factory, in which the great majority of the workers are women. In spite of the explosion the work was carried on without interruption, though several women were killed and others seriously wounded. The remainder displayed perfect coolness, and discipline in dealing with the emergency. As the result of their gallant and patriotic conduct the output of munitions was not seriously affected.

The Commander-in-Chief feels sure that the army will appreciate and be inspired by this splendid example of the loyalty and determination with which their comrades in the munition factories are helping towards victory.

EXPLOSION IN  
SHERBROOKE

Sherbrooke, Que., Feb. 22.—The city of Sherbrooke is again without gas and this state of affairs may continue for some time. During the night an explosion destroyed the main building and the whole eastern wall and roof of the gas house. The boilers and machinery will have to be replaced. Two men, James Muir and Joe Dunn, on duty at the time, were seriously burned and are now in hospital. Many citizens had to partake of a cold breakfast, the large majority of the householders used gas for cooking. The newspaper offices are held up and only curtailed editions of the evening papers can be got out.

Vancouver, B. C., Feb. 22.—It is an unusual event here this afternoon that the negotiations between the government of British Columbia and the Pacific Great Eastern have been concluded, and that the government is to take over and finish the line. The company is to pay the government \$1,100,000, of which \$750,000 will be in cash and the balance due after the war. The government will resume the operation of the trains which were recently suspended by the company and will construct the line from Clinton to Williams Lake, a distance of 100 miles, during the present year. The present settlement is the result of long continued negotiations and puts an end to the civil suits which the province had taken against the railway. The company retains its land development enterprises.

Petrograd, Feb. 22.—An official statement issued today says: "The Russian parliamentary messengers started in a motor car from Roshchinsk for Dvinsk, but near the station at Antonopol were met by a German automobile armed with machine guns. The Russian motor car was allowed to pass, but the parliamentary representatives and the commissioner of the fifth army were detained and brought back to Roshchinsk in the German automobile."

ACCIDENT AT  
FREDERICTON

Walter McGinn Sustains Fracture of Leg by Slipping on Ice—Mother of St. John Man Critically Ill—House Raided.

Fredericton, Feb. 24.—Walter McGinn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis McGinn of this city, was the victim of a painful accident last evening on Queen street. He was walking up the street and started to run out on the road to catch a coach that was going up and in doing so stepped on a loose piece of ice and fell headlong to the street. He was picked up and carried into a store and Dr. Irvine summoned, who on examination found a very bad break about three inches above the right knee. He was taken to his home on Regent street. The accident has caused sincere regret as he was one of the best known young men of the city and a prominent musician.

Woman Seriously Ill.  
Mrs. John McCarthy is critically ill at her home on King street and but slight hopes are held for her recovery. She is the mother of Station Master Charles McCarthy of the C. P. R. and John H. McCarthy of St. John. The police made a raid on a house in Chancery Lane on Saturday night and arrested a woman on the charge of keeping a disorderly house. There will also probably be a charge of violation of the intoxicating liquor act against the woman.

Washington, Feb. 22.—The American general staff is watching the German sweep into Russia with little more than academic interest, quite convinced that Russia is no longer a military factor to be considered and that the situation has little bearing for the present, at least, upon the other battle fronts.

Observers, both here and in Russia, it is understood, are satisfied that the German drive continues it will meet with more resistance. The greater the distance the Germans advance, the more effective would be that resistance, the military experts say, since it would require great numbers of troops to maintain the German transportation lines and give the best opportunity for guerrilla warfare. Eventually they think the vast extent of Russia territory and the great population will form a more definite movement of resistance.

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—Further regulations have been passed dealing with the exportation of silver spruce. It is now provided "that no railway or other transportation company shall accept any shipment of silver spruce unless the bill of lading covering such shipment is accompanied by a certificate from a well recognized lumber inspection bureau or association approved by the Minister of Customs that such shipment contains no silver spruce suitable for use in the manufacture of aeroplanes; provided, that this regulation shall not apply to shipments of silver spruce consigned to the Imperial munitions board."

A railway or other transportation company which fails to comply with the regulations is liable to a penalty of \$500.
