Reports were in circulation this morning that the cap the little boy wore was found in the water near Hunt's dam, but nothing definite regarding this rumor could be learned.

The little fellow was walking along the planks of the foot-bridge that stretch out about seven inches under the bottom of the hand-railing. It is alleged that one of his girl playmates warned him that if he took his hands off the hand-railing he would fall to the water below. It was stated that the boy a few seconds after did this, with the result that he fell. There was only one adult witness of the fatal accident, a man, but his name could not be learned. One of the children stated that the man stood there as if paralyzed, and it was later learned that he was taken to his home in a nervous condition.

When the boy fell into the water his brother and the two playmates who were with him ran to tell his mother, who lives about two blocks from where the accident happened. Mrs. D. Nolan, who lives adjacent to the bridge, heard the screams of the children and went to investigate the cause. When she realized that one of the children had fallen into the river she gave the alarm to some men working nearby.

Motorman Saw Body.

A motorman of a Richmond street car which was proceeding north saw the body in the water and then men running along the river bank on the south side. He at once stopped his car, went to a nearby house and telephoned the fire department. Fire Chief John Aitken and three men reached the scene with a pulmotor and grappling mooks and immediately started dragging the river near where the boy fell in. ### TELLS STRANGE STORY BUT FINE FOLLOWS

Fred Davidson Pays \$10 for Carrying Revolver.

Fred Davidson, 75 Wharncliffe road, did not think any man had the right to come into his home, knock him down, steal \$10 from him, kick him in the face, and scare hig wife, so he armed himself with a 48-calibre revolver, fully loaded, and went out into the street to prevent the man coming back. That was Saturday morning. This morning he appeared in police court charged with having a revolver in his possession. He told a strange story to the court. The man who had outraged him was under the influence of liquor, he said. "He came into my house, and while I was lying on the bed he stole \$10 from me. I thought he had a lot of nerve, so I slapped his face. Then he got mad. He knocked me down and kicked me in the face several times."

Davidson's best evidence was about ten ugly scars scattered about his face. The man who was alleged to have assaulted him was not in court. The prisoner admitted that he had taken a few drinks before the fight. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$10 and costs, and gave him a severe lecture. Arthur Starr, 302 Simcoe street, was fined \$10 and costs for being disorderly on Saturday night. When Starr saw Constable Thomas Fish taking a drunk to the police station he offered to take the prisoner home. The officer refused to grant him the privilege, so Starr proceeded to tell the constable what he thought of him.

In police court Starr swore that he was perfectly innocent, but his "goose was cooked" when Constable Fish gave evidence, which was corroborated by Sergt. Elmer Walsh.

"What did he call you?" the magistrate asked the officer.

What constable Fish said caused a stir among the crowd of spectars, which, luckily, was of men only.

When Sergt. Walsh stated that Starr was still calling Fish names when he was put in the cell, the prisoner yelled out. "He lies."

"That is enough," said the magistrate. "I know what kind of a man you are now. You have convicted yourself with your own mouth."
