

In impression seems to have gotten abroad in some manner or other that the United Cigar Stores, Limited, of Canada is in some way connected with the United Cigar Stores, of the United States, and is controlled by the same interests. This is entirely wrong, and we are anxious to correct it. While our aim of BIGGER AND BETTER SERVICE, coincides with that of the American Company, we are in no manner, shape or form a part of their organization an entirely Canadian corporation, all of our Directors having been born under the "Grand old British Flag." and our Company registered in Great Britain, and her Colonies. An interesting fact in connection with the name, is, that it was first used in Canada, and the first United Cigar Store, located in Toronte, near the corner of Queen and Yonge Streets.

The idea of the United Cigar Stores, Limited, of Cainada, originated in the mind of our President, Mr. W. B. Reid, who is a Scotchman by birth, and a staunch Canadian by adoption. Mr. Reid came to Canada from Rothes, Scotland, in 1888, and immediately identified himself with the tobacco business, being the first man in the Province of Ontario to place Canadian-grown leaf tobacce on the market. Possessed of acute perceptive powers, keen foresight, and a knowledge of existing conditions in the retail tobacco trade, gleaned on his trips throughout the country, he foresaw the great opening there was for a chain of stores, operated, on strictly up-to-date methods, with satisfactory service as their first comideration. At that time the designating mark of a tobacconsist's shop was a "Wooden Indian," with upraised tomahawk, placed outside the doorway, and the methods generally employed inside the store were not much in advance of the civilization depicted by the sign. No attention was paid to the care of stock, and same was allowed to become dry and mouldy. The store was usually dirty, and dusty—the camping ground for all the loafers in the immediate vicinity, and the service deplorable. If you were a regular customer, perhaps, you would be greeted by the words, "Thank you" were never heard.

The idea gradually gained ground, and in 1897 Mr. Reid formed W. B. Reid & Company, the nucleus of the present organization. In 1992 the company was incorported under the name of the United Cigar Stores, Mimited, with a capital of \$20,000, and several branch stores opened in Torogio. In 1814 the Company's capital stock was increased to \$250,000, and more branches opened, including stores in London, Hamilton, Brantford, St. Thomas, Ritchense, and Guelph. In May, 1915, the United Cigar Stores, Limited, Canada, assumed control of the business, and increased the capitalization to \$3,800,600, with Mr. Reid as President and Managing Director. Since that time, despite the abnormal coastions created by the world war, development has gene rapidly ahead, and at the present time we have 160 stores, located in most of the principal cities and towns of Ontario, and in Montrees and Quebec City, and now have plans under comemplation whereby we expect to spread our operations, and have a "UNITED" store in all the principal cities of the Dominion from Coast to Coast.
