"Dear Lorna Moon:

I have a fifteen year old daughter
attending high school; she keeps me
breathless with astonishment at her
proceedings. I have wanted to
keep her a child as long as possible,
and have tried to do so, but she
seems to be more grown up in her
outlook on life than I was when I
married.

In spite of my protests she brings
home highly colored fiction to read,
she calls them 'spies', they are the
only sort of books she will read, that,
and the illustrated movie magazines.
She says I am old fashioned, and
I know that when I don't let her
read those books at home she reads
them at a chum's house. What am I
to do with her; it is impossible to con-
trol a child altogether when she is
absent from me six hours of the day."

Dear Distressed Mother:

If you are careful to sow the knowl-
edge of sweet wholesome womanhood
in your little girl, you do not need to
fear the highly colored fiction very

much. Don't try to keep her a little
girl, little girls can't be "kept" any-
thing, they must just be allowed to
grow. Explain all the mystery of life
and birth to her, if you haven't
already done so, that will be her
greatest safeguard.

You probably are a little old
fashioned, most mothers are. Your
daughter is possibly too new fashioned
it takes a fifteen year old girl to be
an out and out radical. If you can't
lead her away from cheap fiction to
good books, you must read the
cheap fiction with her. The main
thing is don't lose touch with her.
And now to inquire about her
"Queens' Gardens." Talking about
rearing a girl he says "She may fall
and defile her head in dust, if you
leave her without help at some mo-
ments of her life; but you cannot
fetter her, she must take her fair
form and way, if she takes any,
and in mind as in body, must have
always

with overwhelming force.
And now it has been concluded
that these disease of organs were
due to a fight for life against germs,
with a consequent impairment of
function. It is the great
truth—that infections, and not
symptoms of infections should be
treated. The New Medicine does not
shake its head over heart murmurs;
it attempts to find the infection
which causes the trouble and start
a campaign against it. Perhaps it
is the teeth, or the throat, or the
alimentary tract. As one physician
has expressed it—"The Great truth
is that if we can prevent or stay
the infection, we can probably pre-
vent all the effects of the infection
—that is, the bulk of disease."

DEWART'S LABOR PLAT- FORM.

The Labor Policy, adopted by
the Liberal convention in June
1919, is worth a careful perusal.
It is in general in advance even
of the demands of candidates of
the Labor party, and it possess-
es this great merit that the par-
ty which will most likely be en-
trusted with the Government of
Ontario on October 20th is
pledged to introduce the neces-
sary legislation to put this poli-
cy into effect.

This Labor platform reads as
follows:

A general minimum wage for both
men and women to apply generally to
all industry throughout the Province.
The appointment of a permanent
commission to inquire continuously
into the cost of living in various loca-
lities and from time to time, with
power to increase the minimum wage
to such a rate as will, under all con-
ditions, provide a respectable living to
all wage-earners.

A law fixing the eight-hour day for
all industrial occupations, throughout
the Province, as applied to both men
and women.

Better inspection of factories and
other industries where men or women
are employed, particularly with a view
to the protection of women, and a
more rigid enforcement of child labor
regulations.

A law prohibiting employers from
compelling their employees to enter
into agreements not to enter into labor
unions, and a recognition of the prin-
ciple of collective bargaining.

Insurance against sickness and un-
employment, based on the principles
of English law.

Abolition of imprisonment for debt;
the increase of the exemption of mar-
ried men's wages from attachment
from \$25.00 to \$40.00; the revision of
the list of articles exempt from se-
izure for debt, so as to leave the ac-
tual necessities of home life.

And generally in dealing with pro-
tection of men and women, and the
improvement of social conditions, the
committee recommending the follow-
ing:—that "pensions to be admis-
sioned by the Department of Labor,
with power to provide medical atten-
dance and necessities whenever re-
quired for the proper birth and up-
bringing of children."

The amendment of the Dower Act

a fair and adequate share of her hus-

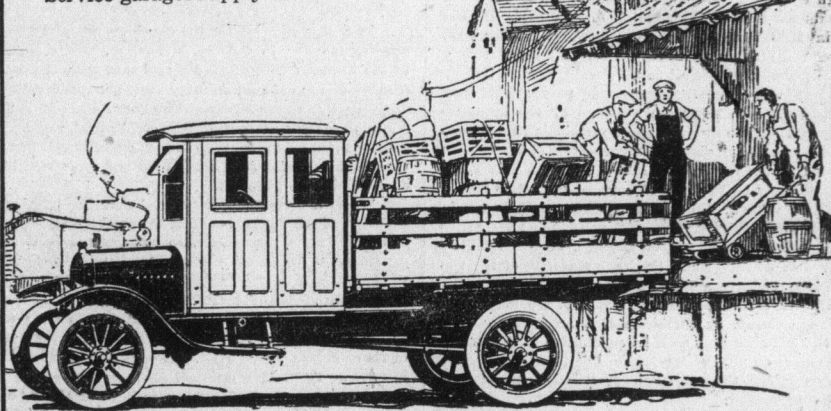
