Armistice Signed at Midnight; Hostilities Have Been Stopped

Official Announcement of Signing of Armistice Made by State Department at Washington Early this Morning--Answer Delayed Until Almost Time Limit by Intense Barrage of German Artillery which Prevented Envoy Getting Through Hun Line.

Washington, Nov. 11.—The world war will end this morning at 6 o'clock Washington time, 11 o'clock Paris time. The armistice was signed by the German representatives at midnight. This announcement was made by the state department at 2:50 this morning.

The House immediately adjourns to give thanks to Almighty God for the deliverance of the world from the great peril."
