Education showed that 55 per cent obtained full-time teaching positions, 24 per cent are teaching part-time, 14 per cent have taken non-teaching jobs in such fields as management, art direction, and career counselling, while 7 per cent have made other plans such as parenthood, travelling and further education.

Now, it will improve your chances if you choose to teach in the elementary rather than the secondary school and if you intend to qualify as a teacher in a Roman Catholic Separate School, or if you wish to prepare as a Special Education teacher or a teacher of French as a Second Language. And there are more jobs available with the county boards than with urban boards like Toronto, Hamilton and Ottawa.
