inches from Similkemeen River. 100 inches from 20-Mile Creek; 100 inches from Mkansitko, Akspepaptein and Chuchumbyshe Creeks; 100 inches from Mamehinst Creek.

MR. HLLIS: What is the difficulty there, Mr. Belley

MR.BALLS: The identification of the streams, I think, more than anything.

MR.BLLIS: That is the water to be supplied,

MR.BALLS: I don't know that there is any contention over the water. Chuchuwayaha is 18-Mile Oreak. The next stream to the south I think has two branches and as near as I could gather from the Indiana these branches were called Akspepaptain and Ekamalika and thestream to the south again is Ekamalika.

MR.ALMXANDER: That is at 15-Mile.

MR.BALLS: Yes, I think that is 16-Mile, there is the 15-Mile Greek below again, but I marked these names from my notes just in pensil. You can see them faintly there. I don't suppose we can get any evidence on the names of these streams.

THE CHAIRMAN: I don't think we need any evidence.

MR.BALLS: All the streams recorded ere being used with the exception of EO-Mile Creek. I think it would be very difficult to get water out of 20-Mile Creek.

THE CHAIRMAN: You.

MR. WELIS: You will retain the record?

MR.BALLS: I think we might ask confirmation of it for what it is worth. If it is possible to get water from it

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
