

INSECTS SPREAD DISEASE.

An Important Circular Issued-Mosqui

The Canadian Director-General Public Health at Ottawa has just received from Surgeon-General man, of the United States M man, of the United States Marine Hospital service, a copy of an imper-tant circular sent to all the medical officers of the service throughout the United States. The circular has an interest to all classes of Canadian citizens. It reads as follows: "Your attention is directed to the import ance of insects as factors in conveyance of disease. There is no longer doubt as to the relation the mosquito to the malarial' dis-eases and to filariasis. According to Simond, plague is transmitted from the rat to man by the flea. The in-fection of typhoid fever, and to certain extent, cholera, may be conveyed from the excreta of flies. Ac cording to the recent work of the Army Commission, the mosquito plays an important role in the transmission of yellow fever. You are therefore directed to give particular attention to this subject, so far as it relates to the work of the service in quarantine and the prevention of the spread of communicable diseases You are advised to carefully guard patients suffering from said disease from the bites or annoyance of insects above mentioned, and to this end to place mosquito netting over the sick bed. Excreta must be treat ed in a manner to prevent their be-coming food or breeding places for insects. Hospitals where communic able diseases are treated should be thoroughly protected with fly screen at all windows, doors, and other openings, particular attention being paid to the kitchen, dining-room and protection of the food. Should mosquitoes, flies, or other insects gain entrance to the wards they be at once destroyed. The best methkilling insects in a large room is by sulphur fumigation. Formaldehyde cannot be depended upon, as it frequently fails to kill insects. Pyrethrum powder when burned an enclosure only stupefies mosquitos and flies, and when used these sects must be subsequently collected

and destroyed. "You are also directed to guard against the breeding of mosquitoes about maritime hospital reservations, quarantine stations, and camps by the methods now in vogue. Collections of water in buckets, barrels, cisterns, and the like are fav-orite places for the breeding of mosquitoes. Such collections should be carefully covered, or, if the cover is not practicable, petroleum should be poured on the surface and replenished from time to time. All collections of stagnant water, pools, ditches, and the like about the reservation should be drained, or, if impracticable, petroleum used as abové. Approximately one ounce is sufficient in still water for 15 square feet of surface, and ordinarily application need not be renewed forone month. Concerning the cultivaquitoes, you are referred to the works of Giles and Howard, which serned, particular attention should especially in regions where malaria and yellow fever prevail. In vessels coming from these regions measures as above indicated should be taken with a view to the destruction of possible mosquitoes or their larvae."

Mountain Air. The reason why mountain air is more healthful than low air is that mountain air is cleaner than low air. The chemical composition of the atmosphere differs but little. On Pike's Peak the relation of oxygen to ni-trogen and other constituents of the atmosphere is the same as at the level of the ocean. The favorable effects, therefore, of a change of air are not to be explained by any difference in the proportion of its gaseous constituents. One important difference, however, is the bacteriological one. The air of high altitudes contains no microbes, and is, in fact, sterile, while near the ground some one hundred feet above it mi-

crobes are abundant.
In the air of Chicago and other crowded places not only does the microbe impurity increase, but other impurities, such as the products of combustion of coal, accrue also. Several investigations have found traces of hydrogen and certain hydrocar-bons in the air, and especially in the air of pine, oak and birch for-ests. It is to these bodies, doubt-less consisting of traces of essential oils, to which the curative effects of tertain health resorts are Thus the locality of a fir forest said to give relief in diseases of the respiratory tract. But, all the same, these traces of essential oils and aromatic products must be counted, strictly speaking, as impurities, since they are not apparently necessary constituents of the air. As recent analyses have shown, these todies tend to disappear in the air as a higher altitude is reached, they disappear altogether.

Fleas Are Great Fighters.

Fleas, taken as a whole, are very quarrelsome and are great fighters. When several are confined in a glass together, they fight incessantly, do-ing most of their battling by standing most of their battling by standing on their hind legs and striking their opponents with the others. In a big battle a half dozen of them may be seen rolling over and over each other, losing legs and antennae and at last giving up their lives in the struggle. There is a record of the struggle. There is a record of a flea which lived ten days after such an encounter with no antennae, three plates of his side broken in, one eye gone, and with only four legs, and these cut off at the first joints.
