OBITUARY.

PAUL CAMPBELL, KENYON

Another of Glenora's most highly respected citizens, Mr. Paul Campbell, died at his residence, 253rd St., Kenyon, on Friday evening, April 10th, having reached the age of seventy-eight years.

He was born and lived and died on the same lot, 253rd Kenyon, his parents being among those sturdy pioneers who left Scotland, the chieftain their forefathers, and came to the then New World, casting their lot in the old Scotch settlement of Glenora.

Mr. Campbell's death the country loses a noble son, his neighbors lose a true friend, and his declining years his must have been to him a deep source of pleasure. Thus he lived, and came to the end of his arduous trial it was the good fortune of the deceased to know that he had lived so as to merit the esteem and admiration of his fellow-citizens.

His death was announced the sudden and very unexpected death of Jeremiah Ryan, which occurred at his late residence, 259 Parley Ave., Toronto, on the 13th April.

Although deceased had been complaining of feeling as well as usual, he had been attending to his regular duties as usual. It was therefore a terrible shock to his family when one day he was taken ill and died.

He was married in 1882 to Honora Griffin, who bore him six children, two of whom survive him, namely, Miss Minnie and W. P. Ryan of Toronto.

By hard work and perseverance he succeeded in educating his children and making for himself and family a comfortable home and living. He was engaged in the coal and wood business in Brampton, retiring from the same some nine years ago and spending the last six years of his life in Toronto.

The funeral took place on April 21st, at St. Mary's church, where Leo Ryan was celebrated, after which the remains were interred in the family plot in the Catholic cemetery.

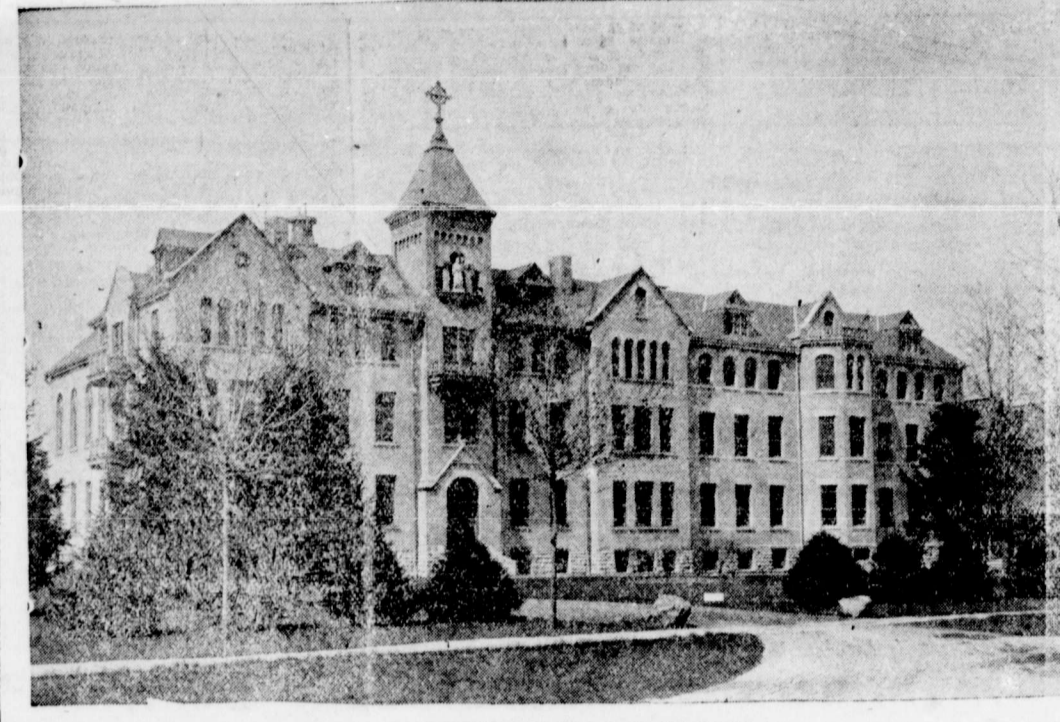
