IN LONDON MARKET THE WINNIPEG MINE FINE CASCADE ORE AT GRANBY SMELTER IN FRANKLIN CAMP IN EASTERN CANADA

MR. A. J. McMILLAN SPEAKS OF HIS RECENT EXPERIENCES THERE.

ABSENCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA ORES FROM THE BUFFALO FAIR.

Mr. Anthony J. McMillan, managing director of the British Columbia (Rossland & Slocan) syndicate, limited, of London, England, arrived in Rossland on Sunday last after an absence of over eight months.

Speaking to a representative of the Miner yesterday, Mr. McMillan stated that owing to the British America Corporation having and other difficulties well known to Rosslanders, it had been extremely difficult this year to interest capital in British Columbia.

What about your own efforts in England, Mr. McMillan? "Notwithstanding many difficulties, we succeeded in successfully placing on the market the Snowshoe mine. Our syndicate—owing largely to the influence of Mr. G. S. Waterlow, who is so well known in Rossland—formed a new company called the Snowshoe Gold & Copper Mines, limited, with a capital of \$250,000, of which \$100,000 is working capital.

On his way out Mr. McMillan visited the Buffalo exhibition, where the Ontario government had a splendid exhibition of minerals in charge of officials of the Bureau of Mines. Not a solitary specimen of British Columbia ore was to be seen anywhere.

Considerable interest, it will be remembered, centred about the long crosscut tunnel driven to tap the vein at considerable depth. It was hoped that this would locate the ore in place, the trouble heretofore at the Winnipeg being that faults were too frequent for the comfort of the operators.

Manager Plewman is highly pleased with the outlook for the Winnipeg. He remarks that much work and worry, together with a few assessments, are ahead of the company before it will be in a position to pay dividends.

GRAND FORKS, Aug. 13.—(Special.) A trail will be built immediately from the forks of Kettle river, 35 miles north of Grand Forks, to the new north fork coal fields, a distance of 40 miles.

Good progress in the work of enlarging the Granby smelter is being made. The labor troubles in the United States however have delayed the completion of some of the machinery.

The enlargement of the smelter building is also in progress. It will contain two furnaces, making the total capacity 1200 tons daily.
