Testing Coment.

The tensile strength of cement is now tested accurately by a, machine of perculiar construction in the possession of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston. The cement to be testid is cast in special moulds, which fit into two sockets, so that no clamping or binding is required, the size of the cement between the sockets, where the strain is applied, being one inch square, the size generally adopted for making tests of this material. The upper socket is fixed, and the pull is applied to the lower one by a goar and screw; and, as the time at which the cement breaks is of importance, the power is applied at a unform rate of 400 pounds a minute. A feature in which this machine is preferable to any other is the absence of all jarring. Testing Coment.

How to Clean a Chain.

A local repair man gives the following advice for cleaning chains: Procure a can about an inch wider than the diameter of the chain when coiled. Get a piece of galvanized wire cloth, with three-dighths or one-half inch mesh, and cut it into circular form, about one-half inch wider than the diameter of the can Make a number of cuts, half an inch deep, around the edge and bend the wire down making a continuous shoulder. Set it in the can thus making a raised false bottom. Coil the chain on it and pour in benzine until it is covered to the depth of half an inch. In a few minutes agitate the chain. Then let it stand quietly for several minutes until the loosened grit and grease have settled to the bottom, then lift the chain perfectly clean out of the clear benzine above the wire Pinch the edge of the can to form a spout, so you may, if economically minded, pour off the clear benzine to be used again.—Chicago Times-Herald.
