NO HAVEN FOR PUGILISM.

It must be admitted that the somewhat startling despatch concerning an alleged proposal to pull off a prize fight at Round Bay, reads as though some thoroughbred Yankee news-monger had been at the creative end of the wire. The roughs who manage such affairs are surely well enough aware that nothing of the kind would be tolerated in this district. However, the authorities are acting wisely in preparing preventive measures. It is well, once for all, that it should be understood just where Canadian communities stand in reference to those matters.

CRISP'S WORK FOR ITALY.

The verdict of the French newspapers, that the death of ex-Premier Crisp, of Italy, will not cause a single regret in France, probably indicates Crisp's chief claim to the gratitude of his countrymen, and it would be well for his fame if Italy remembered him only for the causes for which the French hated him, says the Toronto News. Unfortunately for his reputation with posterity, he was largely identified with the policy of which the fruits were the establishment of an enormously expensive armament and the repression of Italian industries, and he must share the blame for the present impoverished and wretched condition of the majority of the Italian people. He has, however, a real title to the admiration and good will of his countrymen in the determined opposition which he offered to the ambitious schemes by which France sought to use Italy as a mere counter to further her own selfish ends in the game of European politics, and if he helped to plunge Italy deep into debt he was at the same time chiefly instrumental in preventing her from becoming the dependent of a nation which would have sacrificed her on the first needful occasion. French hatred consequently, instead of being a stain on his memory, is perhaps the finest testimony that could have been pronounced on his life work.
