### JANE ADDAMS MADE HOSPITAL DOCTORS GASP

Chicago, Sept. 18.—Miss Jane Addams, the Hull House sociologist, was asked last evening to address the American Hospital Association on a "Layman's View of Hospital Work." She accepted and some of her views were so frankly expressed that she made the hospital physicians present gasp.

"There is an inclination in some quarters to overlook individuality," she said. "The same treatment is not always accorded charity patients that is given those with money. In America, contagious cases are rushed away and isolated and relatives are unable to see the sufferers. In France, they are placed in wards partitioned off with glass, and the patients can be visited and hold conversations with their dear to them."

"Again, it is common in this country to rush a charity patient out as soon as he is able to leave his bed. In Germany, it is almost compulsory for the hospitals to keep convalescent patients until they are able to go back to work."
