THE SOO TRIALS.

Dijections Well Taken and Trials Not

Sault Ste. Marie, Oct. 21.-On the resumption of the sittings of the As-sizes yesterday morning, Mr. Jus-tice Osler gave his decision as to the objection brought up by defendants' counsel, in the corrupt election prac-tice cases Wednesday. He ruled that objection was well taken.

Objection was well taken.

The objection was as to one judge having jurisdiction in such cases, and it was shown that amendments had affected the statutes governing the anected the statutes governing the right of judges to sit on these cases, making them read so as to give the power only to two judges of the rota sitting together, but not to one. The Assizes therefore adjourned until November 8. Attorney-General Wen't Move.

Here is evidence of an interesting feature of the trials. E. A. DuVernet, some time ago, wrote to Attorney-General Gibson asking the Government's assistance in prosecuting the men reported for corrupt practices.

Mr. DuVernet detailed at some length the particulars of the wrongful acts on Oct. 17. Mr. DuVernet received a letter from Mr. Gibson, dated Oct. 14, which, after discussing the application of any fines that might be imposed on the guilty parties, goes on to say:

"As regards section 118 of the contravated Elections As I

controverted Elections Act, I may say that before receipt of your letter and to-day also, enquiry has been made from the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and I learn that no rechancery, and I tearn that no report has been received by him from the judges who tried the petition, nor has any such report been forwarded to this department. Where it is asked that assistance should be given in a prosecution it is essential that definite information should be furnished."

Clarke, Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, deposed that he had received the judges' report on Sept. 30, or two weeks before the date on which Mr. Gibson says he enquired for it in Col. Clarke's hands and could not find it. The prosecu-tion is being carried on by private parties, the Government having re-fused any assistance.

Special Audit Made.

Winnipeg, Oct. 21.—The special audit of the books in which Melvin Bartlett, late clerk in the Provincial Agricultural Department, kept the accounts, connected with the sale of marriage licenses, has been com-pleted. The result will not be made public until the Ministers, who are now busy with Dominion politics, have considered the report. An order has been passed, appointing a commission of two judges to deal with Bartlett's charges against Hugh McKellar, Deputy Minister of Agri-culture, and it is expected that the judges will be at once named and instructed to proceed with the matter with as little delay as possible.
