He referred to the uncertainties and dangers of the present route to India, and said no troops, cannon and munitions of war could be carried across the continent without danger of interruption.—

Some people had stated, and with some show of reason, that the road had been built to fast—that it should have been done that way for many reasons the principal of which was the carrying out of the agreement with British Columbia.
