## COUNTY COUNCIL.

### SATURDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Jan. 20.—Coun. Tozer said Warden  
Connors had been sent to  
Fredericton to attend to the pas-  
sage of the Puddlers Bill, and had  
faithfully attended to that duty.  
He moved that \$20 be paid to  
him for expenses.

Carried.

Coun. Savoy moved that John  
Brown, road com'r., Alnwick, be  
ordered to make return to the  
next session of Council. Carried.

Coun. Betts moved that \$130  
be assessed on Chatham, \$163 on  
Newcastle, and \$85 on Blissfield,  
for the support of pauper lunatics  
in the asylum. Carried.

Coun. Betts moved a resolution  
that the Sec.-Treasurer be author-  
ized to borrow from the Merchants  
Bank, a sum not exceeding \$6000,  
for county purposes.

Coun. Saunders moved that Dr.  
W. A. Wilson be added to the  
Board of Health.

Sec.-Treasurer said the Council  
could appoint only two.

Coun. Uilock moved that the  
boundaries of road divisions in  
Gleng be readjusted, making  
five instead of four. Carried.

Coun. Saunders moved that  
\$475 be paid Alex. Harper, high-  
way com'r., amount due him since  
1897. Carried.

Coun. Betts moved that Sheriff  
Clatt, Ald. Morrissey and Coun.  
Flett be appointed jail committee  
for the current year. Carried.

On motion of Coun. Connors  
the parish officers for Chatham  
were appointed.

Coun. Doyle said the name of a  
young man named Albert McCal-  
lister, of Douglastown, had been  
omitted from the list of volunteers  
to be insured.

The Warden requested that it  
be added, and Coun. Morrissey  
read the list as corrected.

Coun. Betts moved that Warden  
Kerr, Ald. Morrissey and Coun.  
Flett be a committee to act with  
the Sec.-Treasurer in effecting in-  
surance policies on the members  
of the two contingents, citizens of  
this county. Carried.

Coun. Connors moved that a  
central committee be appointed to  
receive and disburse subscriptions  
for the benefit of the families of  
volunteers, and that the Council-  
lers be parish committee to re-  
ceive and disburse and remit the  
same to the central committee.

Coun. Betts, Warden Kerr, and  
Coun. Davidson were appointed  
the central committee.

Coun. Flanagan said the trustees  
of the old Chatham lock-up  
claimed that they should be paid  
rent by the county because the  
Sec.-Treasurer had not dispossessed  
the house to them.

Sec.-Treasurer Thomson said he  
had received no notice whatever  
of the change of the lock-up to  
the town building, and had there-  
fore paid the rent to the trustees  
of the building.

Coun. Connors moved that a  
committee be appointed to settle  
the matter with the Town Coun-  
cil and terminate the lease of the  
old lock-up house. Carried.

The Sec.-Treasurer, and Couns.  
Davidson and Flett, were appointed  
such committee.

A letter was read by the Warden  
from Mayor Winslow, reciting  
the facts in regard to the county  
should take steps to terminate the  
lease.

Coun. Morrissey wanted the  
committee instructed to take steps  
to get the money back that had  
been wrongfully paid to the trust-  
ees, and a clause was added to the  
resolution to that effect.

Coun. Anderson asked if Chat-  
ham had repaid to the county the  
expenses incurred in connection  
with the Public Wharf property.

Sec.-Treasurer—Not yet.

Coun. Connors moved that the  
same committee deal with that  
matter. Carried.

Coun. Flett asked respecting the  
remuneration to be given the val-  
uators.

The Sec.-Treasurer said the law  
did not fix the amount.

Coun. Connors moved that the  
return of John Blake, highway  
com'r., be referred back to the com-  
mittee for further inquiry. Car-  
ried.

Coun. Flett moved that the val-  
uators be paid \$1200 for their ser-  
vices as valuers—\$400 each.

Coun. Morrissey said the valua-  
tors were worth \$4 a day. Their  
work was as arduous as canvassing  
for votes.

Coun. Connors thought the val-  
uators would have to slide over  
part of the work if they were  
paid \$1200. We could afford to

pay for a proper valuation.

Coun. Flett changed his motion  
to \$4 a day for each valuator.

Coun. Ryan said the assessors  
had to be paid for taking the val-  
uation and handling it to the val-  
uators. The assessors would have  
to be paid, as they did the trav-  
elling from door to door.

Warden Kerr was well satisfied  
with the valuations who had been  
chosen. They had great powers,  
and if they performed the duty  
satisfactorily they would deserve  
great credit. They had power to  
change all the figures of the as-  
sessors. The valuation would not  
amount to a row of pins so far as  
guiding assessors was concerned.  
Don't limit them to \$1200, but  
treat them like honest men and  
pay them by the day.

Coun. Saunders said assessors  
had made parish valuations before  
the last valuation, but the valua-  
tors had taken no notice of their  
figures. Do away with the assess-  
ors' valuation, and let the valua-  
tors go thoroughly over the coun-  
ty. There should be a governing  
power somewhere to limit expendi-  
tures.

Coun. Pond thought Coun.  
Saunders' suggestion impracticable,  
as it would take the valua-  
tors two years to do all the work.

Coun. Doyle wanted to know  
what pay the assessors would  
get.

Sec.-Treasurer—Reasonable pay.  
Coun. Doyle said it would be  
impracticable to ask the valua-  
tors to visit every back lot and  
value every horse and cow.

Coun. Johnson wanted to know  
what sense there was in the assess-  
ors making valuations where the  
valuators were not bound by them.

Coun. Ryan explained the details  
of procedure in taking valuations.  
The motion was adopted.

Coun. Morrissey suggested that  
the Board of Health be urged to  
take steps to guard against the  
smallpox.

Coun. Bourque moved that the  
bill of P. Z. Barriault, parish clerk,  
Rogersville, \$6, be paid. Carried.

Coun. Connors, from the commit-  
tee on protests, reported, on the  
Nelson protest, that while there  
were irregularities, they were not  
of such a nature as to invalidate  
the election.

Coun. Morrissey moved that Mr.  
Butler, counsel for the petitioner,  
be heard. Lost.

The report was adopted.

Coun. Connors reported on the  
Hardwick protest—that a constable  
had been sent for John Mills,  
the witness who was required, but  
did not find him, and that the  
matter be laid over till next session.  
Adopted.

Coun. Connors, on the Derby  
case, reported that, as several wit-  
nesses would have to be examined,  
and as there is not time at this  
session to do so, the matter be laid  
over till next session. Adopted.

Coun. Connors reported on the  
Alnwick protest, reciting the law  
and facts. A case had been stated  
to the Attorney General, and he  
had telegraphed that in his opinion  
the election should be set aside.  
The committee left the matter  
with the Council, and recommended  
that the law be changed so that  
protests may be tried hereafter by  
a competent authority. Adopted.

Coun. Savoy moved that Coun.  
Allain take his seat.

Coun. Flanagan seconded the  
motion.

Coun. Lewis moved that Coun.  
Anderson take his seat.

Sec. Treasurer Thomson said he  
didn't think the Council had any  
power, under its by-laws, to give  
the seat to Mr. Allain. The Coun-  
cil should only declare the election  
void. The Town Clerk could have  
given the seat to Mr. Allain, but  
his power to do so had gone past.

Coun. Savoy wanted to know  
how it was that Coun. Mills had  
been unseated and Coun. Sullivan  
given the seat.

Sec. Treasurer said that was an-  
other matter. That was not cor-  
rect.

Coun. Connors asked, supposing  
the Town Clerk had declared some  
other person elected, what then?  
If Coun. Anderson's nomination  
was not correct, the Town Clerk  
should have declared Savoy and  
Allain elected.

The Warden—Secretary Treas-  
urer, how do I stand now? (Laugh-  
ter.)

Coun. Lewis withdrew his  
amendment that the election of  
Mr. Anderson be declared null and  
void.

The amendment carried.

The original resolution, that the  
seat be given to Mr. Allain, was  
then put and lost—9 to 13.

Coun. Ryan moved that John  
McLean be compelled to pay over  
to the Secretary Treasurer 50 cents  
road tax collected by him. Car-  
ried.

On motion of Coun. Saunders  
the parish officers for Nelson were  
appointed; and a by-law was passed  
for bidding sheep from going at  
large in Nelson.

On motion of Coun. Savoy the  
parish officers for Alnwick were  
appointed.

Coun. Pond submitted a report  
on the Sunbury County resolution  
assenting to its protest against the  
Legislature requiring Municipal  
Councils to assess sums of money  
over the expenditure of which  
they have no control, and asking  
the Legislature to repeal such acts.  
Adopted.

Coun. Savoy moved to readjust  
the polling districts of Alnwick to  
correspond with the school dis-  
tricts also to readjust the bound-  
aries of the highway divisions. Car-  
ried.

Coun. Davidson reported from  
the By-law Committee on peddlers'  
licenses. He reviewed the statu-  
tes on the subject, showing the  
state of the law at present. This  
Council being authorized to fix the  
fee by by-law. The committee  
recommended that the fee be as  
follows—\$200 on peddlers who  
have resided in the county, or ad-  
joining county for twelve months,  
been assessed there for that time,  
and been a resident of the prov-  
ince for at least ten years and been  
assessed for that time; \$200 on  
peddlers who have been residents  
of the province for ten years and  
have been assessed for that time;  
\$400 on other peddlers. Carried.

Coun. Davidson reported from  
the committee on the payment of  
revisors, recommending that each  
revisor in Chatham and Alnwick  
be paid \$10 and each of those in  
the other parishes \$6. Adopted.

Coun. Doyle moved that the re-  
muneration given the revisors in-  
clude horse hire, office hire and sta-  
tionary and other incidental ex-  
penses.

Coun. Morrissey said this would  
require the valuator to pay for  
printing the notices sent to prop-  
erty owners. He suggested strik-  
ing out incidental expenses.

Coun. Doyle struck out this  
phrase and stationary, and the res-  
olution passed.

Coun. Savoy moved that \$10 be  
appropriated for the purpose of  
furnishing a report of Council  
proceeding to a French paper.  
Carried.

Coun. Betts moved that the  
Blissfield pauper lunatic fund be  
paid.

Coun. Morrissey moved that Mr.  
Butler, counsel for the petitioner,  
be heard. Lost.

The report was adopted.

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The amendment carried.

Coun. Pond thought the resolu-  
tion should have been introduced  
before the appointment of the  
Inspector.

Coun. Swim thought it entirely  
unfair.

The Sec.-Treasurer said the In-  
spector could employ any attorney  
he liked, but the Council had  
power to curtail his expenditure  
to cut down his bills if they  
thought them excessive. The re-  
solution was in order.

Coun. Saunders had never  
known any of the Inspector's ex-  
penses to be curtailed.

Coun. Doyle thought the legal  
fees excessive.

The motion was lost—0 yeas, 12  
nays.

Coun. Flett called attention to  
the outbreak of smallpox and  
thought the Council should take  
immediate and decisive steps to  
combat the disease. He moved  
that a committee be appointed to  
act with the Newcastle Town  
Council and Chatham Town Coun-  
cil to take steps to prevent the  
spread of the smallpox in the  
county. Carried.

Committee—Betts, Flett, Tozer.

Coun. Davidson, from the By-  
law Committee, reported a by-law  
abolishing the July session and  
providing for the payment of bills  
by a committee. Adopted.

Committee—Davidson, Flett,  
Connors, Pond, Tozer.

Coun. Connors reported from  
the County Contingencies Com-  
mittee, the sum required being  
\$8000.

Report adopted.

Coun. Morrissey wanted to know  
what would happen if the Board  
of Health would not act.

Coun. Connors said the Provin-  
cial Board of Health would act in  
that case.

The resignation of Coun. Betts,  
as Councillor for Derby, was read  
and accepted.

Ordered that J. L. Stewart be  
paid \$50 as official reporter.

Ordered that the constables be  
paid the usual fees.

Coun. Tozer moved that \$250  
be assessed on account of Inspect-  
or Menzies' salary. Carried.

Coun. Connors called attention  
to an act passed last session  
which relieved the town of Chat-  
ham from assessment for Scott  
Act purposes. He moved that a  
committee be appointed to confer  
with the valuator for the pur-  
pose of apportioning the Scott Act  
assessment to be levied on that  
portion of Chatham outside of the  
town limits.

The following committee was  
appointed—Connors, Kerr, Wal-  
den.

Coun. Flett—If the Board of  
Health for the county refuse to  
act—what then?

The Sec. Treasurer read the law  
defining the powers of the Council  
regarding sanitary regulations.

Coun. Flett moved that the  
Warden be authorized to fill vacan-  
cies that may occur on the County  
Board of Health during the year.  
Carried.

Coun. Davidson read the law  
defining the powers of the Board  
of Health in respect to smallpox  
and other diseases.

Coun. Saunders moved a vote  
of thanks to the worthy, able and  
efficient Warden.

Coun. Morrissey was called to  
the chair.

Coun. Pond seconded the motion  
and said the Warden had discharg-  
ed his duties with great credit and  
ability. Carried.

The Chairman tendered the  
vote and the Warden resumed the  
chair.

Warden Kerr was proud of the  
vote. He was proud to preside  
over a Council of so great ability  
as the present one. The debates  
of the Council were worthy of the  
Legislature.

Coun. Connors presented the re-  
port of the committee on the scale  
of a session for Scott Act pur-  
poses, which had been made up by  
the valuator, who had just been  
sworn in and himself. Adopted.
