## General Intelligence

GREAT EXCITEMENT IN MONT-  
 REAL TO-DAY.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.—The suspension  
 of the Banque Ville Marie has had most  
 unfortunate effects in this city and district.

The small depositors in all the French  
 banks have become frightened and are  
 withdrawing their deposits as rapidly as  
 they can. As a consequence of this need-  
 less alarm, the Banque Jacques Cartier  
 yesterday afternoon suffered such a rush  
 upon its branches that the directors  
 decided to suspend for thirty days.

There does not seem to have been any  
 just reason for this run, and everybody  
 expects that the Jacques Cartier will pay  
 dollar for dollar. The greatest misfor-  
 tune of the day, however, is that there was  
 no need for alarm by either depositors or  
 shareholders or shareholders, that the  
 directors were now receiving reports  
 from all the branches, and that he had  
 \$1,200,000 and his latest statement thirty  
 days had expired the bank should have  
 been able to resume business on a favorable  
 basis.

But this suspension of the Banque  
 Jacques Cartier is not the only result of  
 the defection of Teller Herbert, of  
 the Bank of Montreal. The greatest misfor-  
 tune of the day, however, is that there was  
 no need for alarm by either depositors or  
 shareholders or shareholders, that the  
 directors were now receiving reports  
 from all the branches, and that he had  
 \$1,200,000 and his latest statement thirty

The French banks are feeling the run  
 more than any of the others, but all of  
 the monetary institutions are now re-  
 ceiving unusual requests for withdraw-  
 als.

One of the largest crowds is besieging  
 the premises of the Banque of Hochelaga,  
 but there the directors are prepared for  
 the deposits. They have provided them-  
 selves with \$1,000,000 in gold and silver  
 in gold and Dominion notes and are  
 meeting all claims upon them. Whether  
 they will withstand or run away, the  
 result of this is a question which only the  
 future can solve. This bank's capital is  
 \$1,200,000 and its latest statement thirty  
 days had expired the bank should have  
 been able to resume business on a favorable  
 basis.

The local branch of La Banque Na-  
 tionale is also besieged with people but  
 as this is only a branch of the main bank  
 of service trouble unless the panic ex-  
 tends to Quebec, when anything may hap-  
 pen.

This will long be remembered as  
 "Black Tuesday" by the bankers of  
 Montreal.

The Quebec Archbishop Bouchet has  
 just issued the following circular letter:

"At the end of an interview with  
 several important business men of Mont-  
 real, I have been informed that many of  
 my duty to appeal to all those who have  
 savings in car banks and to pay them  
 at once. I therefore beseech the public  
 of the last few days. I speak now  
 in the interest of all the people. A run  
 on the banks at the present time could  
 have no other than the most disastrous  
 results for these institutions themselves,  
 as well as for the depositors and for the  
 country. I therefore beseech the public  
 to keep calm. The Archbishop's  
 place is to keep the peace. The Arch-  
 bishop has done much to restore the  
 public confidence, and unless there  
 should be fresh disturbance from  
 other banks the crisis may be considered  
 as past.

A number of small depositors from  
 the country districts came into town  
 this morning and drew out their money,  
 but there was nothing like the same  
 excitement that there was yesterday.

Members of the Legislature of the  
 Jacques Cartier bank are receiving re-  
 ports from their various branches of the  
 most encouraging character. In many  
 cases the depositors express a willingness  
 to allow their money to remain, as they  
 have every confidence in the bank's  
 stability. Perhaps the most encouraging  
 report in this connection comes from  
 Ottawa, where no fewer than eighty per  
 cent of the depositors have manifested  
 their confidence in the bank. It would  
 not be surprising if the Jacques Cartier  
 bank were to resume long before the  
 thirty days allowed by law.

It is stated to-day on good authority  
 that the Seminary of St. Sulpice, the  
 leading Catholic institution here, and a  
 good deal to do with the steaming of the  
 panic. Late yesterday afternoon its  
 managers withdrew \$600,000 from the  
 Bank of Montreal and deposited it with  
 the Hochelaga. The large French-Can-  
 adian business houses also gave effective  
 aid by making large deposits, varying  
 from \$10,000 up to \$170,000.

QUEBEC, July 2.—Though there was  
 no disposition on the part of Quebec people  
 to withdraw deposits in institutions with  
 head offices here, such as the Quebec  
 Bank, Union Bank and Bank Nationale.  
 The management of the latter bank says  
 they were not informed of the run until  
 run on their branch at Montreal, and do  
 not fear any further attack. The faith  
 of people of this city in its institutions  
 suggests the stability of these concerns.

**M. P. S. GET EXCITED**

AND MAKE A SCENE IN COMMITTEE.

**STILL ANOTHER DROWNING.**

**PARKER KNOX, A FARM LABORER,**  
 THE VICTIM.

**FREDERICTON, Aug. 1.**—Another  
 drowning is reported from Queens-  
 town. A young man named Parker Knox,  
 aged twenty-seven, a farm laborer, went  
 to Queens- town on a boat for a few  
 days previous and was not seen for  
 some time. He was supposed to have  
 been killed by a shark. His body was  
 found yesterday, when his dead  
 body was discovered, by an Indian on  
 the shore, about half a mile before Ororo-  
 mo village.  
 An inquest was held before Coroner  
 W. H. Thorne and a jury last night  
 and they found a verdict at two o'clock  
 this morning that deceased came to his  
 death by drowning.  
 Knox is said to have been insane at  
 times when drinking, and it is believed  
 by some that he drowned himself while  
 laboring under a temporary mental  
 derangement.  
 Deceased was a son of the late Capt.  
 Knox, who was drowned at sea some  
 years ago. His mother lives at a Bristol-  
 Hill.

**DEATH OF MR. WESLEY VAN-  
 WART.**

Mr. Wesley Vanwart, Q. C., ex-Mayor  
 of Fredericton, who was stricken with  
 paralysis a few days ago, died early this  
 morning. Mr. Vanwart was a popular  
 and highly esteemed resident of this  
 city. He was a son of Mr. George  
 H. Vanwart, of Queensbury, and a  
 brother of Judge J. A. Vanwart. He  
 was a young man, only 38 years of  
 age, but had gained a splendid reputa-  
 tion.

## Exhibition Notes.

In the 1899 Prize List of the St. John,  
 a sweepstakes class for carriage horses has  
 been added, in which over \$500 is put up  
 in prizes. Horses that have been ex-  
 hibited in other classes and won prizes  
 will also be allowed to enter in this  
 class. They will be shown in harness,  
 and the harness and carriage will be  
 considered in making the awards. There  
 are sections in the class for tandem and  
 four-in-hands as well as for matched teams.  
 In the cattle classes the prizes have also  
 been increased. Prizes will this year be  
 given for a brooder's young herd and also  
 for both two-year-old cows and two-year-  
 old heifers in all pure bred cattle classes.  
 In the dairy grade class a prize has been  
 added for the best herd of four grade cows  
 over one year old and at least three to be  
 milked.

The swine classes will give prizes to  
 boars and sows under 1 year and over 6  
 months, and also to them under 6 months.  
 Prizes to sows with litter of not less than  
 five pigs will be added.

It is proposed to put some permanent  
 scoops in the poultry building, and a prize  
 list much more extended than last year is  
 being put up.

Among the other additions cash prizes  
 and diplomas will be given for the heaviest  
 dozen of wild eggs, heaviest dozen of  
 brown eggs and the best display of eggs  
 laid by pure bred fowls.

The Canadian Pacific Railway is  
 arranging to make a display at the St.  
 John Exhibition of the products of the  
 various parts of the Dominion through  
 which their line runs, and as it will be  
 planned and carried out in this corpora-  
 tion's thorough going display, very large  
 and complete display is assured.

Special efforts are this year being made  
 to bring the restaurant service at the St.  
 John Exhibition up to the highest level of  
 efficiency, so that visitors to the Exhibition  
 need have no fear of getting other than  
 good food, well cooked and cleanly served.

The amusement features will be especial-  
 ly good. Among the attractions will be  
 Prof. Sutherland's wonderful trained  
 animals, including horses, dogs and goats.  
 The performance will be given in a ring  
 in the open grounds visible to all any  
 afternoon not raining.

The arrangements with the Intercolonial  
 Railway for the carriage of exhibits are  
 being completed. The starting charges on ex-  
 hibits by express, must be prepaid to St.  
 John, and soon after their arrival will be  
 returned to the exhibitor. All exhibits  
 will be billed back free to start-  
 ing point, if accompanied by an Exhibition  
 certificate and in the hands of the original  
 owners.

A special concession is made to shippers  
 of exhibits from points within the Province  
 of New Brunswick more than 200 miles  
 from St. John by which it is arranged  
 that when the exhibits are returned unpaid  
 the starting point, the Intercolonial  
 Railway will refund to such shippers the  
 freight charges paid in excess of the 100  
 mile rate. This practically means that  
 no New Brunswick exhibitor at Intercolonial  
 points will have to pay a cent
