HERE'S ANOTHER RAILWAY DEAL WHICH IS ABOUT CONSUMMATED.

The Kent Northern to Pass Into The Hands of an
American Syndicate. With Big
Aspirations.

WILL ERECT CONNECTING LINES.

Enterprising Syndicate May Solve Problem of Winter
Navigation To P. E. Island. A Road To Chatham
Contemplated.

The Advocate is enthusiastically informed, through a reliable source, that the Kent Northern Railway, at present controlled by a local syndicate, is about to be sold to an American syndicate. The Company has been in the hands of a local syndicate for some time, and the syndicate has been unable to raise the necessary capital to complete the line to Chatham. The syndicate has been unable to raise the necessary capital to complete the line to Chatham.

The Kent Northern, which at present runs between Kent Junction and Richmond, will be extended eight miles by the new Company to a suitable harbor and wharf, made with Prince Edward Island. A fast boat will be placed on the strait route, and the Company hopes to solve the problem of winter navigation to the Island. The company will also provide a charter to extend the road through to Chatham, a

Ald. Armstrong Declares That
Some Who Have Sewerage
Won't Pay For It.

OTHERS WANT IT.

Regular Meeting of Town Council
—Question of Lights and
Meters Discussed.

Some who have sewerage decline to pay for it and those who haven't it want it and are willing to pay for it. This is the sewerage matter stands according to some of the aldermen.

The regular meeting of the Council was held last Wednesday evening. There were present, Mayor Brown and Ald. Russell, Morrison, Ritchie, Armstrong, Grenley and Lawlor. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

City Engineer Waddell suggested to the Council by letter that all public places having lights should pay metre rent and dispense with the \$10 minimum. He also suggested that all parties not using up to \$1 worth of light per month should pay metre rent also.

The matter was discussed by Ald. Morrison, Grenley and Armstrong and then referred to the light and water committee. Ald. Ritchie brought up the matter of dumping ballast in the public slip. He stated that he was under the impression that the town intended filling in the slip. If his firm could get rid of ballast in their ships in this way they would continue to come to Newcastle but if not they would have to go to other points on the river. If the town agreed to take the ballast he would see that the vessels came here.

On motion of Ald. Morrison the offer of D. & J. Ritchie & Co. was accepted and the Board of Works instructed to attend to the hauling of the ballast.

The Water and Light Committee reported that a number of lights had been installed and also recommended the following bills for payment:

L. M. Larsen Home From South
Africa Tells of conditions
There.

THOUSANDS UNEMPLOYED.

Chinese Labor, Scheme of Capitalists
For Cheap Labor—N. B. Boys
There.

South Africa as it is today is no place for any man unless he is a capitalist. Thousands of white men including first class mechanics and ex-soldiers are looking around Johannesburg and other places unable to get work.

Such was the statement made to a reporter for the Advocate yesterday by Mr. L. M. Larsen of this town who returned here on Thursday after three years' service in the South Africa constabulary.

"Why the place is overrun with unemployed," he went on, "a first class mechanic who came over in the same boat with me in South Africa nine months and during that time could get only nine days' work."

Mr. Larsen is of the opinion, however, that the soldiers had returned home when discharged things would not be so bad.

Questioned regarding the importation of Chinese labor Mr. Larsen observed that in many quarters it was regarded as a scheme of capitalists to get cheap labor. There was any amount of labor but civilization had made it a little high.

Mr. Larsen said that there was so much disease among cattle in S. A. that farming had become unprofitable.

"The Boers, well the majority, are quite contented," he said, "and if there is any enmity it is between themselves—between those who took up arms for the British and those who held out to the bitter end."

Mr. Larsen said that Moffat, Ryan, Wiggins and Campbell of St. John intended remaining the full five years and also Walter of Chatham.

McGrath, also of Chatham is still out there. He is married to an English girl. Mr. Larsen looks none the worse for his five years' sojourn in the Dark Continent.

Answers were without trace and he declared that many who had sewerage would not use it or pay for it while others who did not have it wanted it and were willing to pay for it.

The matter was dealt on at length after which the Council adjourned.
