Regular Meeting of Town Council -Question of Lights and Metres Discussed.

Some who have sewerage decline to pay for it and those who haven't it want it and some of the aldermen.

The regular meeting of the Council was held last Wednesday evening. There were present, Mayor Brown and Ald. Russell, Morrison, Ritchie, Armstrong, Gremley and Lawlor. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved:

City Engineer Waddell suggester to the council by letter that all public places having lights should pay metre rent and dispense with the \$10 minimum. He also suggested that all parties not using up to \$1 worth of light per month should pay metre rent also.

The matter was discussed by Ald. Mor rison, Greniley and Armstrong and ther referred to the light and water committee Ald. Ritchie brought up the matter of dumping ballast in the public slip. He stated that he was under the impression that the town intended filling in the slip If his firm could get rid of ballast in their ships in this way they would continue to come to Newcastle but if not they would have to go to other points on the river. If the town agreed to take the ballast he would see that the vessels came here.

On motion of Ald. Merrison the offer of D. & J. Ritchie & Co. was accepted and the Board of Works instructed to attend to the hauling of the ballast,
