### Women's Institute Convention Closes

The delegates to the provincial convention of the Women's Institute returned to their homes last Thursday. The three days of the convention were dealt with at the concluding session, following a luncheon served by the St. John Institute, the delegates were taken for a drive around the city. For the last two days of the convention bright sunny weather contributed to its success.

Mrs. T. N. Vincent presided at the session dealing ably with some disputes that arose. Mrs. John Harvey, of Fredericton, protested against the supervisor, Miss Hazel McCain, having authority to select representatives for this province and made the charge that her appointments were influenced by political and religious bias. Mrs. Harvey not having given notice of motion that the provincial convention should have authority to make such appointments, it was declared out of order.

A resolution asking the government to appoint two women to be on the board of motion picture censors and one asking the government to add a branch of kindergarten instruction to the normal school curriculum were passed.

A resolution was brought in which asked for support in caring for the feeble minded and that the Institutes aid Rev. George Scott, of St. John, in his efforts to improve the status of the feeble-minded. While support was approved by the convention it was left to the various Institutes to take action in the matter at their discretion.

Mrs. Harvey in a resolution asked for the reinstatement of the Canadian Home Journal as the official organ of the Institutes. Miss McColm explained that because it had been decided to print a federal paper the Canadian Journal had been replaced by the inclusion of the institute reports in the government agricultural reports.

An invitation was received from W. H. Golding to view a special showing of motion pictures in the Imperial Theatre, but the business of the session prevented the convention from being able to accept the invitation which it highly appreciated. Thanks were extended to Mr. Golding.

The session adjourned to partake of luncheon at which Mrs. T. N. Vincent and Mrs. A. J. Mulcahy poured the refreshments were prepared by Mrs. John Stack, and the luncheon was much enjoyed.
