James A. Christie identified the box as the same one he received from Helys at the Police Office, and testified to arresting Orr at 2 o'clock on Saturday morning, when Orr was pretty drunk and stupid, witness having shaken him several times.

John Richards was sworn, and said he mailed two letters in the Brayley House box at ten on the night of the 13th. (Letters produced and identified.) The one to Mr. Clinch would be a valuable one, as it contains railway passes.

James McMurray also identified letters mailed by him in the Brayley House box. The letters, he said, were of no value, and Mr. Rainford drew attention to the fact that there was a notice on the box to the effect that letters containing money were not to be dropped in.

A J. Phair, letter carrier, said he served the letter box at 12.45 on Friday the 13th, and found it gone at 5.45 the following a.m. He identified the box in Court as the Brayley House P. O. box. He saw the box next in Police Court, where he had opened it. There were letters in the box. The notice on Mr. Rainford stated that they would not be ready before Friday.

Mr. Wetmore—"I will not be ready before Friday, as I have a criminal case in the County Court on Thursday."

The Judge—"Then we will say Friday."

Wednesday's Proceedings.

The case of Elliott and Merrieth was resumed this morning. At 10 o'clock the Grand Jury presented the following address to the presiding Judge:

"The Honorable George E. King, Judge of the Supreme Court of the Province of New Brunswick.

"BY THE GRAND INQUEST OF THE COUNTY OF YORK, take this first opportunity we have had to congratulate your Honor upon your elevation to the position of Judge of the Supreme Court. Your distinguished career in the political arena since Confederation is known to us all, and we are glad to have learned that since you have been upon the bench you have, by your firm, dignified and impartial administration of justice, given evidence that the Judiciary of New Brunswick has not lost character by your appointment. In the County of York we have had the special opportunity of forming an estimate of the worth and ability of the Judge, and in no part of the Province are we more highly esteemed; and we feel you will prove a worthy acquisition of the long line of illustrious and useful cases; and we hope that you may for many years exercise the high and responsible functions of your office.

"Please convey to Mrs. King and your family an expression of our warmest good wishes, and our sincere congratulations.

"Foreman Grand Jury of the County of York." "Grand Jury Room."

"Frederick, Jan. 17, 1892."

The address was not read in Court, owing to the fact that the jury had been formally discharged the evening before, but a copy was made of the address, and in a few words, acknowledged its receipt, thanked the Grand Jury very much for it, but said he could not accept of himself all the kind wishes.

"The case of Elliott vs. Merrieth was resumed at the close of the plaintiff's case in Elliott vs. Merrieth. Mr. Gregory moved for a nonsuit which his Honor refused to grant but reserved the point; whereupon Mr. Gregory opened the case for the defence.

THE TRIAL OF CHARLES ORR FOR THE THEFT OF A P. O. BOX LETTERS.

The trial of Charles Orr for the stealing of the Brayley House P. O. Box contents was commenced Friday in the Supreme Court, before Mr. Justice King. E. L. Wetmore, Esq., Q. C., Deputy Crown Officer, conducted the case for the Crown, and H. B. Rainford, Esq., appeared for Orr. The following jury was empanelled: Herbert Estey, George Good, Perley True, Wm. Coy, Alex Hainey, Moses White, David B. Barker, Jas. Sutherland, Thos. A. Barker, R. D. Andrew, Andrew Anderson, John A. Barker. Mr. Wetmore said the indictment consisted of two counts under 28th Vic, Chap 7, Sec 42, which provides a penalty of from 3 to 5 years, the Legislature having made the penalty heavier than for common larceny for the greater security of the mails. He reviewed the circumstances of the case and said that whether the letters were valuable or not did not alter the offence with which Orr was charged.

Byron Coulthard was sworn and detailed the discovery by him of the fact that the box was missing, and the subsequent events until he was taken into custody, when he came to the box under his arm which looked like a letter box. Coulthard took the box from Orr and handed it to Mr. Helys. While they were taking him home, Orr said he did not take the box; that it was given to him, and that he would not "sneak."

Cross-examined by Mr. Rainford he said he did not know that the box produced in Court was the box he saw the man with. He knew Orr well, and thought he had been drinking.

James W. McCready was also sworn, and testified as to the events of the night of the 13th.

J. D. Neale was sworn, and testified to overtaking the prisoner with a box, in company with others. The box was taken away from Orr, and he was taken home. The box was taken to the Brayley House, and he afterwards saw the box taken from the prisoner given to policeman Christie. Orr acted like one under the influence of liquor.

Charles A. McCausland remembered the night in question, testified to the events leading up to his finding Orr with a box like the one in Court, and to helping to take Orr home. He noticed that the P. O. box was gone from the Brayley House door, when he came out the first occasion. Orr had been drinking, and witness thought home was the best place for him, so he and Mr. Coulthard had taken him there.

A. J. Phair also testified to the events of that evening and the finding of the box with Orr. He took the box to the Police Court and gave it to Policeman Christie; he identified it from a set of his hands, and he identified it.

Financial Panic in Paris.

Arrival of the Marquis of Lorne.
