A CUBANER dispatch of Monday says: The Spanish steamer Carthagenas, from Aviles for Barcelona, proceeded after being in collision on Sept. 22nd, off Cape Villano with the British steamer Rhodania, from Hong Kong, for London. The latter vessel was sunk and her crew with the exception of one seaman and the captain were drowned.

ADVICE from Sakkim, Egypt, say that the only organized remnant of the Khalifa's army was defeated and its last strong hold, Gadarfeh, captured on September 22nd, after three hours hard fighting when an Egyptian force numbering 1,300, under Commander Colonel Parsons, routed 3,000 dervishes of whom 500 were killed. Three Egyptian officers were wounded, 37 Egyptian soldiers killed and 69 wounded.

In compliance with the request of his Honour Lieutenant Governor Howland, Supt. Sharp has kindly consented to issue return tickets at one first-class fare from all stations on the P. E. I. to farmers and fruit growers who will attend the meeting of the P. E. I. Fruit Grower's Association on Oct. 4th, and on the return trip present a certificate of attendance from the secretary of the Fruit Grower's Association, to the Conductor. Those tickets will be issued for the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of the afternoon of the following day. Members present will be furnished with certificates of attendance.

The Montreal Star of Friday last reports: "There was little that was new in the butter and cheese market this morning. Cheese sold up to 9 1/2c at Brookville yesterday, which would mean 9 1/2c laid down here, but buyers were not willing to concede this figure. A good deal of the business in spot is in the hands of the Montreal firm, which will not go above 9 1/2c. Eastern cheese is firmly held and 8 1/2c is quotable for colored. Butter holds steady, and for fresh creamery in boxes 20 1/2 to 21c is the range. Held goods will scarcely go above 20 1/2c, and eastern dairy ranges from 18 to 17 1/2c, while western has sold from 16c to 15 1/2c."

A CAIRO dispatch of the 25th says: General Kitchener, commanding the Anglo-Egyptian expedition, has returned to Omdurman, having established posts at Fashoda and on the Sobat River. The troops did not fight except with a few dervish boats on the way south, which was captured. The London Daily Telegraph's Cairo correspondent telegraphing on Monday, says Kitchener found the French at Fashoda. He notified Marchand that he had express instructions that the territory was British and that the French must retire and offered them passage to Cairo. Marchand declined to retire until ordered by his government; no fighting occurred. Marchand was given to understand that the British insisted upon their claims and the rest has been left to settle diplomatically between the respective governments. Kitchener hoisted the Union Jack and the Egyptian ensign, and left a garrison to protect the British flag.

The steamer Lake Winnipeg, of the Beaver Line Steamship Company, of Montreal, arrived at this port on Thursday afternoon last, and left for Liverpool on Saturday morning. She first made fast to Connelly's wharf, but in order to buy greater depth of water she moved to Peake's wharf Thursday night. The work of loading freight commenced Thursday night and all day Friday. The Lake Winnipeg is 255 feet, 2 inches long; 40 feet 2 inches beam, and 31 feet 2 inches deep. Her gross tonnage is 3329 and her net tonnage 2124. She has three decks and five holds, the lower one being the cold storage compartment. She is fitted up with powerful engines and in every way completely equipped as a first-class freight steamer. Her ordinary speed is about 14 knots. She was built in 1879 at Clyde Bank, Dumbarton, Scotland, by J. & F. Thompson of Glasgow. Her cargo on hand here included 4000 boxes cheese shipped by Dillon, Biffin, H. Haspard and Carvell Bros; 500 packages butter, B. Heavis, 9000 cases eggs, Anil Bros, and R. Tennant; 800 sheep, E. Whately and E. Henderson; 75 cattle and 10 horses, E. Wheatly; 1000 sacks oats, Nelson Battenbury; 100 tons hay, Carvell Bros, and E. McKenna; 20 bbls apples, John Newson, Benj. Heavis and Charles Curtis.

BARRON Star Pointer, the two fastest harness horses in the world, Joe Patchen and John R. Gentry had a match race at the Roadville, Mass., track on Thursday last, and the Marks horse won in two straight heats. A stiff wind blew down the stretch and kept the horses back, so the time was slow, the first heat being in 2:06 1/2, and the second in 2:04 1/2. The first heat Patchen, who was driven by his owner, C. W. Marks, of Chicago, had the pole, and at once went ahead, being a length in the lead at the quarter. The horses kept the same relative position until well by the half mile post; when Gentry began to close up and almost nailed Patchen at the three-quarter pole. From there to the finish the crowd saw a grand race, for Mr. Marks drove in the best style and managed to keep Gentry at his wheel until just as the finish, when the big bay almost caught him, the two horses going under the wire with only Patchen's black nose in front. The next heat, up to the half mile, was practically a repetition of the first, for Patchen went immediately to the front, and not only kept the lead, but was three lengths at the three-quarter pole. Again Gentry made a great start in the stretch, but was not fast enough for Patchen, and the latter won the heat and the race by a good length. Time—first heat, 2:06 1/2; second heat, 2:04 1/2.


