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WANT RAILS EAST FROM EDMONTON

Board of Trade Endorses Request of Toledad For Earliest Possible Railway Connection.

(From Thursday's Bulletin.)

There was a larger attendance than usual at the Board of Trade monthly meeting yesterday afternoon. The matters for discussion embraced a wide programme, but they were all expeditiously dealt with. The most important question was that of the laying of rails east from Edmonton pending the completion of the Battle River bridge. In their efforts to secure the earliest possible railway connection to the Toledad and the owners of the Beaver Hills district will be assisted by the Edmonton people in every way possible.

Rails East From Edmonton.

The following resolution passed by the Board of Trade was submitted to the Edmonton board and asked for endorsement.

Resolved, That the Board of Trade Commission for Canada, Ottawa, Ont., be requested to advise the board as to the earliest possible date for the laying of rails east from Edmonton to the Toledad and the owners of the Beaver Hills district.

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Protecting River Banks.

The secretary said a number of people had recently enquired if any had been done towards protecting the banks of the river. The Public Works Department, Ottawa, has written two or three favorable letters, but no definite action had been taken. It was moved by P. E. Lessard, seconded by S. W. Candy, that a telegram be sent to the department. The motion was unanimously endorsed.

Want Better Mail Service.

A petition signed by the residents of Athabasca Landing asked for a semi-weekly, instead of a weekly, mail service. It was endorsed. On motion of Mr. Griesbach, seconded by James McGeorge, it was agreed that the consideration of the draft by-laws stand over till next meeting, and in the meantime any members wishing to make amendments submit them to the secretary before next meeting.

A Road Running West.

The secretary submitted a letter from H. J. Fetter, representing Foley, Welsh & Stewart, with reference to a permanent road to be laid out from Wabunan Lake. The company stated that it was necessary to build roads for transportation of their supplies, and if the government intended where the permanent roads were to be built that they would build and endeavor to obtain assistance from the government later. The matter was referred to the government for their consideration.

A VAST FOREST RESERVE.

Government to Set Aside Eastern Slope of Rockies.

Montreal, March 12.—An important announcement was made at the Dominion Forestry convention by the Hon. Sidney Fisher to the effect that the government had decided to set aside the entire eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains for ever as a forest reserve, extending from the boundary of the province of Alberta to the coast. This vast region will be kept free from settlers and held for forest growth, which would be kept from time to time under strict regulations, and preserve it for all time as a forest reserve for the west. The announcement was received with hearty applause. The convention which is held here for the first time in many years had a most auspicious opening, and the story of many of the interests of the people of Quebec in forest preservation, and the interest displayed by the Catholic clergy.
