

Question of Quarantine.

An special meeting of the City Council was held yesterday forenoon to discuss the latest developments in the typhus fever outbreak. Dr. Brehm attended and was closely questioned by the Mayor, Councillor Channings and Councillor Mullaly, each of whom expressed upon the Health Officer the necessity of strict quarantine being enforced, and said that it was safe to err in this matter on the safe side. Dr. Brehm stated that he was not prepared to hold the inmates of a house under quarantine after being disinfectected. The rule followed so far, he said, was that when a patient was removed from a house the place was disinfected and released from quarantine, although other inmates who may be developing the disease, other people who wished to do so were allowed to visit at will. When Mr. George Cheeks was removed to the Hospital and his house disinfected, the house was not quarantined, and there was no prohibition put in force to prevent others from visiting his son and daughter who afterwards developed the disease, and are now in hospital. It is true that instructions were given to a watchman on Fanning's house, a considerable distance away, to pay an occasional visit to Cheeks' premises, which in itself was an admission on the part of the Health Officer that there was danger of people visiting Cheeks house catching the fever. Now, everybody knows how many nefarious deeds have been committed by the inmates of a Cheeks' house after the father was taken to hospital. Certainly the watchman watching Fanning's house was unable to prevent people from going

He received his newspaper training on the Boston Herald, of which he was Newfoundland, where he went out and got the news, set it up himself, put it on the press, and then sold the papers.

For 56 years Mr. Squire was a member of the British Charitable Society, of which he was Secretary for 27 years and president for two years.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.

With more elastic powers, Finance Minister Fielding and Minister of Customs Patterson are engaged drawing to completion a Reciprocity agreement between Canada and the United States. This agreement will be along the lines of a miniature application of the principles of free trade and will not touch drastically upon the manufactured products of either nation; nor is it likely to affect the Industrial World. It is believed that Pulp Wood, Coal and Lumber have been visited by the Canadian states.

A warrant has been issued against Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, one of the most prominent citizens of Toronto, and candidate for the Mayoralty in 1963. He is charged with making false returns to the Government, in connection with the Peace Bank, of which he was the first President. The General Manager, W. R. Travers, was today sentenced to six years' imprisonment.

LONDON, Jan. 16.

Annual Report tion of Of

The Board of Trade held its second annual meeting in its regular yesterday afternoon, with the following results in the office. The Secretary read the annual report, which in part is as follows:

He Council regretted the partial failure of the fishery in 1891. But the Board did not extend that of the previous year by 15,000 quintals. Westward of St. John's the fishery yielded fair results, although in some localities the voyage was uncommemorative.

Northward of St. John's, in Trinity and other Bays, the fishery was considerably short; while in the Straits and on the Labrador it had been one of the worst on record.

This shortage enhanced market values, and the average prices for foreign markets are probably as high as they ever reached. The prices paid fishermen in many cases have been phenomenal. The long period of bad weather was a serious drawback to the merchants, as it resulted in leaving much partially made fish in the hands of the merchant, would have been fully made for market.

The small and yearly diminishing fishery of Gloucester has induced some enterprising American firms to send vessels to our ports to buy green fish. They purchased large quantities of this fish at satisfactory prices to us, and it is generally expected, in view of the revised apportioning of Newfoundland fish imposed into the United States in American bottoms, that this business may be continued, and probably largely developed.

It is to be hoped that the Premier's contemplated visit to Washington, in reference to fishery matters, and the decision arrived at by the Arbitrators at the Hague last summer, may now amount to a satisfactory arrangement with United States of the fishery dispute in question, but that the cordial spirit which is now being manifested by Newfoundland and the United States towards each other may eventuate in more satisfactory trade relations, and to the advantage of both countries.

A very brisk business was done in December, probably the best for many years.

Year by year an increasing foreign trade is done in the outports by steam merchants, who purchase wholesale in St. John's.

houses in St. John's, showing a considerable increase in turn-over, with a normal standing in the cost of assistants in retail trade, it is unquestionable if profits have increased.

Lumbering has been carried on with increasing vigor with the advent of last year. The European markets are not good, but those of South America and healthy, the building of the branch railroads has provided considerable labour. The increased work on railway construction, the rise in prices of fish, and additional work of employment, have been added to the spending power of the people, and in the revenue. The Minister of Finance collected for six months \$2,000 more than in the corresponding period of the previous year. The financial condition of the country is good, and the two or three \$500,000 have affected the general trade very little.
