Why Have They Failed?

We again draw attention to the failure of the Government to supply a record of the state of the foreign markets to which our staple is shipped. The Premier has promised fishermen a weekly report in order that they may have a clear record of facts on which to form a fair and reasonable opinion as to the prices which should prevail locally.

Mr. Piccott, the Minister of Fisheries, has had this project in hand, and has failed signally to supply regularly information from our chief markets which is of any practical value. Why he should fail is a matter of comment. Considerable information is published weekly in New York by the Fishing Gazette. Why the Government cannot get it as speedily as the New York Fishing Gazette is remarkable. In the issue of September 2nd, which is before us, we have prices quoted in the New York wholesale market, for Newfoundland, large Maderia, 112 lbs., \$8.00 to \$9.00; Newfoundland, Porto Rico butts in bond, \$22.00 to \$23.00; Newfoundland, Rio, tubs, cts., \$8.75 to \$9.00.

We also notice the report of Holmwood & Holmwood, of the Ontario Fish Market, dated Aug. 17th; S. Ramirez & Co.'s weekly report of the Porto Rico Fish Market, dated San Juan, Aug. 22nd. Besides these there are reports from Havana, St. John's, Nfld., St. John, N.B., Halifax, etc. This goes to show that information is available if proper steps are taken to secure it.

Why, then, have Premier Morris and Minister Piccott failed in their undertaking? Since writing what appears above, we find that the effort to obtain prices abroad has been resumed and to-day the Minister of Fisheries has received two messages, one from Bahia and the other from Pernambuco.

We hope he will continue his efforts until the criticism given above is unnecessary.

Census Enumerators Go on Strike

We learn to-day that 6 or 8 men who were employed to take the census here, quit the job. They say that it is physically impossible for any man to undertake the work of taking the census in any district. They had to ask about 200 questions and must make entries in 9 books which they are compelled to take around with them and added to this no definite amount of remuneration has been allowed them for travelling expenses. The men denounce the "Big Chief" in this connection and if he heard some of the strictures passed upon him to-day the uneasy feeling he experiences over the prospective Burin election would be intensified one hundred fold. The soubriquets given to the Tory party by the Telegram of late are not enough but these men say another should be added and that the present Tory Government should be called the "Bum" Government for they are trying to get men to do their work for little or nothing while the Premier and his pals are spending money in thousands.

Police Make a Seizure

Head Constable Daws was a very active man the past 24 hours working up the case against the parties who sold old metal to B. Kesner, the junk man, Water St. West. Four barrels of old brass and other ends of metal were seized and taken to the police station last evening by the order of Head Daws. Some of the property was identified as having come from the premises of one of the telegraph co's, operating in the city. The employee of the company who sold the stuff to Kesner, on being confronted by Head Daws, said that he had had permission to gather up the old odds and ends in the store and do what he liked with them. It is said that more of the copper, brass, etc., was identified as having been taken from the Reid Nfld. Co. premises. An investigation is going on and an arrest will likely be made this evening.

How the Strike Stands

The L. S. P. U.—500 men—held an emergency meeting last night and discussed at great length the strike at Crosbie's. All decided to stand by the union. Maritime work is as usual at Crosbie's wharf. The Union men say that though they may not be able to stop the work at Crosbie's wharf, still they will prevent shipping for him at all other wharves. They will refuse to handle any freight of the Nfld. Produce Co's boats. At the present time there are 500 coaks of wire on the wharves, wharf brought up by the Fogota to go to Pitt's wharf and the truckmen refuse to handle it. They sent out city-cars to-day to all the merchants of the ward warning them that they will not handle Nfld. Produce Co's freight.

A Bovine Visitor.

Shortly after 2 p.m. yesterday as a number of cattle were being brought up off Pitt's premises, a big bullock walked into Bowring's hardware store, and none of the men in presence until the animal put its head over Mr. Williams' shoulder as he was busy at work on some of the tools. He was not a little surprised and somewhat scared, and to get the bovine visitor out without damaging the stock was a problem; nevertheless, secured it and not a cent's worth of damage was done.

King's Road, As Witnessed by T.M.S. For the past few months the residents of Military Road and those of King's Road are subjected to disorderly conduct almost every Saturday evening, caused by the employees of the Sanitary and Water Departments, after being paid their weekly allowance. But Saturday's outbreak there eclipsed all other such occurrences, a quarter of an hour or six municipal employees, well filled with rum, pummelled and kicked each other in the presence of hundreds of other employees who to their credit, he it said, were sober, and who attempted to make peace between the rowdies and their interference were turned for their interference were turned upon and were unmercifully maltreated and had to seek medical aid. The nearby residents fearing a riot, communicated with the police station by telephone. The call was responded to by the appearance on the scene of an officer, and Sergt. Lovelace, who in quick time restored order much to the relief of the residents. Much severe comment was made as to why Sergt. Cain and assistant made no arrests. The city representatives should immediately cause an investigation to be made about these occurrences and to remind those drunken employees that those nearby residents who are compelled on each Saturday evening to witness such conduct help to pay their wages. If such disturbances happen again the Council will be asked to dismiss the guilty employees.
