This step, we believe, has been contemplated for some time past, for reports to that effect have been current for many months. Sir Edward Morris is evidently keen on obtaining recognition for journalists who do service to himself, his party and his Government, for Mr. McGrath is the second journalist Sir Edward has recommended for a seat in the Legislative Council, and whom he has seen appointed to that dignity, for among the previous group was the Hon. J. A. Robinson. At present, therefore, both the editor of the Daily News and the editor of the Evening Chronicle are Legislative Councillors. It is a curious coincidence that Judge Prowse, who has done much to honor the Morris administration in the foreign press, is a recipient of a C.M.G. We treat this, however, as a coincidence, and prefer to rest the cause of the honour on the Judge's standing as the historian of Newfoundland. We congratulate both recipients on their New Year honours.

LONDON, Jan. 1.
The New Year Honours List is short, but Canada is well represented in the Colonial list, which is headed by Mr. Borden, the Canadian Premier, who becomes a Privy Councillor. Among the new honours are Sir T. G. Carmichael, Governor of Madras; Sir Alfred Thomas, for many years leader of the Welsh party in the House of Commons; Samuel H. Morley, ex-Governor of the Bank of England. Among the new baronets are William Nelson, Chairman of the Nelson S. S. Line; Thomas Skinner, Director of P. R.; J. B. U. Chisolm, of the Times; H. Rider Haggard and S. J. Pocock. The Canadians honoured besides the Premier are Colonel Gibson, Lieut-Governor Ontario; Joseph Pope, Under-Secretary of External Affairs, made K.C.M.G.'s; T. C. Boville, Deputy Minister of Finance, C.M.G.; Lieut.-Col. Dudolph Forget, Montreal, G. B. Lovento, Knight Bachelor.

Blocked With Ice

Capt. J. Keane, of the Home, wired to the R. N. Co. to-day from Bay Islands:—"Left Port Saunders at 5.30 a.m. saw no chance of getting down the Straits on the Newfoundland side. Am now leaving for Persons' Pond to land freight."

Official Had a Hard Time.

Mr. J. W. Mitchell, Postal Telegraph Inspector, returned by the s.s. Prospero and again went north on her yesterday. He got off the Home at Brig Bay on Nov. 12th, installed a new telegraph office there, and at Flower's Cove, and then had to travel 100 miles, taking operator Matthews of Cape Norman and three men with him, also a team of 10 dogs drawing a komatiek on which was their instruments and gear. It took three days to cover the distance. On the second day out they were overtaken by a terrific snow storm. But that the exertion of beating a path for their dogs kept up the circulation, all must have perished. Often they had to desist for a while as they were nearly smothered by the drift. They only made 20 miles from daylight till dark and reached Boot Harbor completely exhausted and with their dogs scarcely able to crawl along. After resting that night they proceeded to Foggo's Harbor, near Cape Norman, leaving Mr. Matthews there. Mr. Mitchell here took nine dogs and two fresh men and started with a komatiek for St. Anthony, travelling across country, and crossed the bottom of Pistolet Bay, which was blocked with Arctic ice. At the entrance to Bartlett's River, up which they proceeded, dogs and men in crossing thin ice went through, and how all were not drowned is a mystery. They beat their way to more firm ice and clambered out on the dogs' backs, then rescuing their fore-footed friends, and arrived at St. Anthony late at night after a miserable journey and with their clothes frozen to their backs and the dogs in a pitiable condition. The next day they started for Gritquet and arrived there safely, opening an

Trains Collide.

A collision of two express trains occurred at Stephenville Station at 9 o'clock last Friday night. The west bound train was standing at the station waiting for the east bound to pass. The latter was slowed down when nearing the station as usual, but the brakes did not work well owing to the cold weather. As the brakes did not act the plow on the east bound struck the plow on the stalled train and knocked it across the rails smashing and breaking the iron work also. The truck was knocked right across the rail. A delay of two hours was the result before the incoming express could get under way. She arrived here at 3 a.m. Sunday. The R. N. Co. are now holding an enquiry.

Fell 19 Feet.

This forenoon a young lad, named James Morrissey, whilst at work on board the steamer Almeriana, discharging at Pitts' premises, fell into the water tank of the steamer, and received severe injuries about the head. The lad had a miraculous escape from death, as he fell a distance of 19 feet.
