

#### A BUDGET FROM LONDON.

LONDON, Feb. 22. omarines, by means of which Ger nany has declared she will blockad the British Isles, daily becomes a fac tor of more and more importance in the great war in Europe, with respec to its influence on the policies of the nations engaged and in connection to neutral states. The day passed without any addiional merchant belligerent or neutral hip having fallen victim to German marines, but three small British craft are missing and fears are expressed as to their fate. Traffic in the North Sea remains somewhat disorganized, the Dutch and Scandinavian teamers showing reluctance to go to sea owing to the menace of both sub narines and mines. Reports from Copenhagen that traffic between Swelen and England has been tempor arily discontinued, are not officially

The British newspapers print tolay two conflicting versions of the recent battles by which the Germans, frove the Russians back over the East Prussian frontier, but naturally they are inclined to accept the Russian version. The Russians fell back in orderly fashion, fighting an effective rearguard action.
