As far as he knew the Bill was without precedent either in the Mother Country or sister Colonies. In England there was a tax on profits, known as excess profit duty, over and above profits made in pre-war times. He really believed that was what the Government were after to collect here. In the Bill before us now, said Sir Edgar, all profits above \$3,000 are to be taxed. In Canada they levy a War Tax, and allow free of tax 7 per cent on the paid up capital of an Incorporated Company and 10 per cent on private business houses. That was a material difference from the Act asked to be passed here. The capital in a company registered and paid up here is not permitted to have an interest charge free of taxation, although a man may be running a business with money borrowed from the Banks and he could charge up according to his business the interest he paid into the Bank. Why, Sir Edgar asked, should borrowed capital be treated differently to money borrowed from sharehold ers. Money, he said, is entitled to the same consideration in any business. He questioned whether the Bill before the House called for the best method of raising the money needed by the Government.
