Education.

4. BUILDINGS.

(Continued.)
The Inter Denominational Committee at an early period of its deliberations was confronted with the question of the buildings in St. John's, used at elementary schools. One such building had been condemned ten years ago, but it was still in use. A number of other elementary school buildings were in much the same condition, and the committee felt that they really were not suitable for use as schools, and in some cases were prejudicial to the health of the pupils and teachers.

takes into consideration the health and well-being of the children as well as mental development. A minimum of 200 square feet per child is the standard set down for the play grounds. It was evident to the experts that play space, recreational grounds, athletic fields, game courts, etc., had not been considered here as a part of the physical equipment of school plants. This was especially marked in St. John's, even in the best educational buildings, window ventilation was depended upon entirely, and with the weather and temperature of this country there are many days during which window ventilation cannot be used while the classes are in session, and the children are therefore required to breathe and rebreathe the same vitiated air, hour after hour.

Another important consideration was the question of light in the classrooms, and it was found that only 10% of the class-rooms in colleges and elementary schools have anything like adequate light. Over one half the class-rooms in the city were so poorly lighted, that the experts give it as their opinion that this condition is undoubtedly responsible for life-long impairment of vision in a great many school children, and for many headaches, sickness, general discomfort and absence from school. Such condition of course greatly hampers the work of the teacher.

The people are interested in the education of their children, and the Boards of Education have done what was possible with the meagre funds at their disposal. The "possible" was not what it should have been, as the present system scatters, instead of consolidates, money and energy.

If those in authority and the people who have children attending the schools realize the actual state of things, there will certainly be very greatly changed conditions in relation to education in St. John's.

Much can be done by co-operation, and for the sake of our children, and for the future well-being of Newfoundland, all thinking people will be willing to unite in any plan that will place education in St. John's upon a better footing, with the proper and necessary surroundings.—COM.

At the City Hall.

The Weekly Meeting of the Municipal Commission was held last evening at 7.30 p.m. in the City Hall. The Chairman, Messrs. Gilling and Commissioners Ayre, Mullaly, Morris, Peet, Vinicombe and Devine were present. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The following matters were then dealt with.

A communication was read from the Colonial Secretary, stating the Government regret they were unable to guarantee bond issue of the St. John's Gas Company, as recommended by the Council.

The Colonial Secretary replied to Council's request for refund of duty on building materials, stating the Government regret they were unable to refund duty on materials for future construction but could not grant rebate on materials used in buildings already constructed.

Application was received from the Railway Commission to erect temporary shed at West side of Station. Council gave no objection to this erection if an undertaking is given to remove same on three months notice.

Owing to applications being received for the houses now under construction it was decided to build four more on the present site.

Monroe Export Company asked attention to retaining wall at their South side premises. Council acknowledged no liability in the matter.

A communication was received from the Newfoundland Motor Association conveying to the Council their appreciation of the work done on LeMarchant Road.

Solicitors Howley & Fox, on behalf of Mr. Geo. Summers questioned the right of the Council's interference with their client in his building operations near Windsor Lake. As every precaution must be taken to prevent pollution of the City Water Supply, it was decided to expropriate the land in question, as also that of Mrs. Phelan and Mrs. McGuire near New Found Pond.

A report was read from City Solicitor Carter in reference to the above matters.

A communication was received from the Secretary of the War Veterans' Association asking why consideration was not given applications of two returned soldiers for a recent vacant position in connection with the Council. The applications referred to were received after the position had been filled.

Canadian Bank of Commerce will be given water supply for fire protection and domestic purposes.

Avalon Telephone Company will be given sewerage connection to new building provided it pays cost of extension.

C. W. Hatcher, Spencer St. is to be permitted to erect temporary storm porch on condition it is removed in the Spring.

Mr. W. F. Coady asked compensation for damages caused through choking of main sewer. The matter is to be investigated.

Mr. Jas. Murdoch forwarded plan of layout of building lots, Sudbury, properly and asked approval of same. When the owner of the property in question gives an undertaking for the expenditure that would be incurred in opening up this new street, consideration will be given the matter.
