THE PASSIONS.

(Continued.)

Passion Without an Accompanying Reason—There can be no conception of any motion without an accompanying feeling.

What kind of any emotion of would be left if there were not the feeling of quickened heart-beat, shallow breathing, or goose-fleshing hair and quiver empty about the stomach?

Who can fancy the state of and picture so boiling in the face, no flushing of the face, no tingling of the nostrils, and no tingling of the teeth?

What would grief be without its sobs, its suffocation of the lungs, its pang in the breast?

Expressions of the same rule in the same way. There are no emotions, however.

Have all seen people dumb with emotion, talking and shouting, and then how faint will cause blood to rush into a man's head of driving it away. We have seen those who have met with a running around in grief, crying and lamenting instead of sitting down, and silent.

The Passions First Felt in the Body—Let those who this question silly pay attention to following instances:

When we are reading or listening to a story we are often surprised at how it suddenly flows over our and at the heart swellings and that sometimes unexpectedly ex-

He had never heard that the sight of blood produced faintness and sickness, and he had no repugnance to it and no thought of danger from it. And even at his young age he could not help wondering how the mere presence of a painful red fluid could cause such violent effects in his body.

Flight—When a person jumps at a loud sound, he says, the noise frightened him. But he never felt any real fear or thought there was any danger. Many men can never grow used to standing beside a cannon when it is fired off, although they know perfectly well there is no danger either to themselves or others. The mere sound is too much for them.

Can the Bodily Manifestation of an Emotion Precede the Passion Itself?—Many give a negative answer to this question. An actor, they say, can stimulate an emotion and yet be inwardly cold. We can all pretend to cry and not feel grief. We frequently feign laughter without being at all amused. On the other hand, experience shows us that the bodily manifestation sometimes does precede the emotion.

Emotions Feed Themselves—Everyone knows how a panic in a theatre is increased by flight. How the giving way to the symptoms of grief or anger increases those passions themselves. Each fit of sobbing makes the sorrow more acute and calls for another fit, stronger still. And it is only with absolute exhaustion that rest comes. In a rage we all know how a man can work himself up. How the more he storms the angrier he gets.

Suppressing Passion—Refuse to give in to the outward expression of a passion and the passion itself dies. Count ten before venting your anger and he will seem ridiculous. On the other hand, sit all day in a moody posture, sigh and rave to every question with a dismal voice, and you will remain melancholy.

First Tawdry Woman.

October 17 is the festival of Tawdry, in the Calendar of the Church of England, a famous Saxon who died in A.D. 679, but from whom was derived the word "tawdry," being very shrewd, but with beauty pretended, whether applied to things or to people themselves. The daughter of Anna, King of Angles, or the east side of England, which included the present Norfolk, Suffolk, and Essex. Her name abbreviated into Saint Audray, was adopted into its present form, it became though by her death was twice married, the first preserved her now as personal

virginity, and would never live with her husband as a wife by day or by night. Having separated from her second husband, Cyphrid, King of Northumberland, she wore the veil of a nun, and became foundress and Abbess of the Monastery of Ely, in Cambridgeshire, which was the great religious centre of the eastern counties. And her life of great sanctity, and severe asceticism, or self-denial and self-control made her festival most celebrated. But the unreality of her marriage unions, and their consequent notoriety, were the origin of the word "tawdry," a contraction of her name common from her time, being applied to habits which, behind a good appearance, are only a sham. This whole character and career of hers were narrated by Bede, surnamed "the venerable," who lived from about A.D. 672, till about A.D. 735, an English monk, who wrote in Latin an Ecclesiastical History of England, and completed a translation of Saint John's Gospel into the Saxon or present English language.

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

Codfish—The total exports from Newfoundland this week were 73,613 quintals as follows: Firm Outports—By schr. David Morris from St. Anthony, 3,380 qtls., by T. Tracey to Exeter; by schr. Rie from Twillingate, 3,676 qtls., by W. & J. Moores, to Gibraltar for orders; by schr. June from Balne Johnston & Co., from Battle Ht., 10,700 qtls., to Gibraltar for orders; by schr. Ariete from Forward & Tibbo, Grand Bank, 2,658 qtls. to Oporto; by schr. General Ironside from S. Harris, Ltd., Grand Bank, 4,985 qtls. to Oporto; by schr. Linda Tibbo from S. Piercey & Tibbo & Sons, Grand Bank, 1,945 qtls., to Halifax; by schr. John Llewellyn from Harvey & Co., St. Jacques, 4,629 qtls. to Oporto; by schr. Ethel M. Bartlett from the Burlin Import and Export Co., 2,350 qtls. to Lixoes, Spain. From St. John's—by s.s. Nestum from Harvey & Co., 23,116 qtls. to Alicante; by schr. Casarina from the Monroe Export Co., 5,714 qtls. to Pernambuco; by schr. Schmidt from A. E. Hickman Co., Ltd., to Oporto, 2,788 qtls.; by s.s. Rosalind from various shippers to New York, 10,912 qtls.

Cod Oil—The demand is somewhat improved in the United States market, and the big leather manufacturing plants are showing signs of more activity. The export to New York by s.s. Rosalind was quite heavy and amounted to 35,200 gallons from Messrs. Job Bros. & Co., Ebbury and the Franklin Agencies. There is also some heavy shipments booked by s.s. Digby for Boston.

Cod Liver Oil—The market is still very dull and no improvement in the demand. As the supply available here this season is very small compared with other years, it is generally believed that there will likely be a bitter demand about the turn of the year, as the Norwegian supply is becoming exhausted on the west coast, which they have been satisfied to sell all the season.

Pork—The imports for the week were 587 barrels. The local quotations are unchanged and are as follows: Mess and Short Cut, \$29; Fat Back, \$25; Morris Family, \$36; Spare Ribs, \$26 to \$27. The market is quiet and steady in Chicago and New York, and the slight firmness that was in evidence last week fell away again. Mess Pork is not easily obtained just now from the United States Packers. There is a considerable demand for this grade at this particular time.

Beef—The imports of Beef this week amounted to 1,035 barrels, being principally Boneless Flanks. The Fall trade has so far been lifeless, consequently there is not much beef moving into consumption. It is expected, however, that within a few weeks conditions will be more encouraging and that the stocks here will be moving out. The demand for Koeber beef during Yom Kippur and Rosh-Hashana, and the other Jewish holidays this month, was an influence in temporarily strengthening the market. Local prices are: Bos Flank, \$26; Libby's Special Family and Special Plate, \$27; Boneless, \$21.25.

Flour—After persistent declines in the wheat market since July, there was a turn to higher prices on Monday last of three cents a bushel, and Tuesday to six cents. Many dealers believe that the lowest point for the season was reached last week. Latest reports from the United States have reduced the yield of spring wheat and the recent report from Canada also shows a big shortage on the estimate. It looks then, as if the next four months will be lowest this year. The prices here to-day are \$11.50 to \$12.50 for high grades.

Sugar—The market continues dull and weak with no change in quotations since our last issue. Present prices are extremely low and there is not much expectation that prices can decline much further. Experienced dealers express the opinion, grounded on the comparison of prices covering many years that the bottom has been reached. It must be remembered that if we eliminate the present duty sugar would be costing us 4½ cents a pound. The prices to-day here at 11 cents wholesale and 11½ for single barrels. The imports this week 1,000 barrels and 760 boxes.

Potatoes—Local farmers are lower in their prices this week and have sold as low as \$3.00 per barrel. We

shall not be surprised to see even lower prices while the digging season is on, and before the winter stocks are put in cellars. In the outports the price is \$2.50. The consumption is below normal owing to scarcity of labor and money. The price of potatoes in P.E.I. declined 60 cents a barrel this week and still lower prices are looked for there by November.

Apples—Big shipments of "Kings" the first for the season arrived this week. They are higher than Gravensteins and selling at \$7.00 to \$7.75 per barrel. The demand is limited at this high figure, and sales are slow. Gravensteins are about out of season and when the present remains of stocks are cleaned up, there will be no further big importations for this season.

Hay—The market keeps on the downward course still, and local prices to-day are quoted at \$51 to \$53 per ton, 2½ cent a pound for small lots less than a ton. There is quite a lot held in this market and there are some heavy shipments to come forward next week. There is no likelihood of an advance in the fall months, but when navigation closes and steamers stop running of the St. Lawrence. We look for a strong market about the turn of the year.

Oats—The market is very weak and importers are inclined to hold off for still lower prices. The recent advance on wheat, however, will likely be reflected on all grains, and it is quite likely that oats have reached their lowest point this week.
