In regard to investments, Mr. Tory liffered from the previous speaker. ontending that the logical outcome of the great wealth and confidence enjoved by insurance companies, together with their knowledge acquired in the course of business, must be that they should aim at acting as distributing agents between those who had the money and those who needed it.

Mr. Tory pointed out that indemnification of the individual for loss sustained could not recoup the community; and for this reason effort was being directed to preventive measures on land and sea against destruction of property and life, the "safety first" being an indication of this. He threw out some suggestions for a school of salesmanship, and in general put forward a strong argument for raising the standards and ideals of the insur-





BERLIN, (Associated Press) Thousands of Germans have been bankrupted by the recent craze for speculating in the stock market. The losers were not limited to ware earners and professional men with inadequate incomes, but included many comparatively wealthy men. The workmen and professional men claimed that speculation is not a vice, but a necessity, for men whose incomes are 3,000 marks a month or less. They say they "plunged" in the market in the hope of being able to win enough to pay their bills and to buy clothing for themselves or a dress for their wives. Some of those who lost their earnings in this way have disappeared from their positions Others are making the round of their acquaintances in an effort to borrow and the remainder are stolidly facing debts which they cannot hope to pay.
