OFFSIDES!

There is no more vexatious rule than the offside rule in football. Players and spectators alike very often disagree in the excitement of the game, and the poor old referee is usually on tenterhooks. As a matter of fact, it is the bane of his existence. We therefore feel that a discussion to-day on this subject will not only be interesting but instructive as well. Rule 6 of Association Football is: "When a player plays the ball, any player of the same side who at such moment of playing is nearer to his opponents' goal-line is out of play and may not touch the ball himself, nor in any way whatever interfere with an opponent, or with the ball, until the ball has been again played, unless there are at such moment of playing at least three of his opponents nearer their own goal-line. A player is not out of play when the ball is kicked off from goal, when a corner kick or a throw-in is taken, when the ball has been last played by an opponent, or when he himself is within his own half of the field or play at the moment the ball is played by any player of the same side."
