OPENING SERVICE TONIGHT.

Commissioner Sowton, Territorial Officer for Canada East and Newfoundland, accompanied by Lieut. Colonel Morehen, arrived by S. S. Sitou on Thursday to conduct the Annual Congress. In connection with the year's Congress gatherings Colonel Morehen, who has been appointed by General Booth as the Sub-Territorial Leader for the Salvation Army in Newfoundland, will be given a warm welcome. The Colonel is coming to Newfoundland after 37 years' active service in the Army, all of which have been spent in the British Isles. During the last five years he has had the oversight of the work in Wales. He therefore has in his new appointment his first taste of Colonial warfare. The opening service of the Congress begins to-night at the No. 1 Citadel, New Government Street, when a special meeting for Field Officers, Local Officers, Soldiers and Recruits will be held, the 3 City Corps units will meet on Sunday morning there will be a muster parade of all city Salvationists, visiting officers and Nos. 1 and 2 Troops of Life Saving Guards. Starting from the Citadel, New Government Street, the procession will proceed via Hamilton Street, LeMarchant Rd., King's Hill, Theatre Hill and New Government Street to No. 1 Citadel, where there will be a united Holiness Meeting conducted by the Commissioner. At 3 p.m. a Public Reception will be held at the Methodist College Hall, presided over by His Excellency the Governor, Sir William Allaire, supported by a number of prominent citizens. In connection with this reception the new S. A. Leaders for Newfoundland will be installed by Commissioner Sowton. At 7 p.m. the Commissioner will preach in the Methodist College Hall.

In Passing.

The Humber and Railway agreements are now accomplished facts, inasmuch as that His Excellency the Governor at a special session yesterday afternoon officially assented to the Bills, which were duly signed and recorded.

Many rumors are current as to the contents of the Finance Minister's Budget, which will be delivered in the Assembly on Tuesday. One of the many is that the Government will favor a reduction all around of the salaries of the civil servants. Another is that certain taxes will be increased and that provision will be made for the floating of a new loan which will be negotiated between now and the early session of 1924.

That the Government's determined policy to collect and expend will be continued for another period is a safe assertion.

Hon. Dr. Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines, is a passenger by the S. S. Manco to-day en route to his native home in Prince Edward Island, where he will spend an extended holiday and in the meantime look over some Model Farm stock and equipment.

The Model Farm gobbled up over fifty thousand dollars of the last loan, all of which was expended, as well as other grants allocated by the Legislature.

The Agriculture and Mines Department was likewise accorded almost one hundred thousand dollars from the 1922 loan, and the total expenditure of this department struck up a new record when the million and a half dollar mark was reached.

Perhaps the most outstanding feature of the spending of the loan which comes to light is that of the Controller's department, as will be shown by the figures published elsewhere. Incidentally voted by the Legislature amounted to \$2,000,000, which sum was increased over four hundred per cent; whilst the amount expended for stock totalled \$537,206.06, against the \$150,000.00 allocated by the Government.

The Government's loss on the Pitt Prop account is nothing short of a crime. The gross amount spent was \$1,593,439.56, for which the returns total \$156,828.44, leaving a startling deficit of \$1,436,611.12. That the greater portion of these big expenditures occurred during last fall and the early months of this year previous to the general election will in itself reveal the motives behind same and explain the utter disregard which the Government entertained for public moneys in their mad race for power.

Once again the question of child labor has come up for discussion. The alleged actions of an East End baker, which were unfolded in the Magistrate's Court yesterday, are responsible for the new interest that is manifested in the subject. We learn of many incidents of this nature which would bear investigation with beneficial results, and offer the opinion that the authorities or organizations which time and again have interested themselves with this question should once more give it their attention for the purpose of giving necessary protection regarding healthy surroundings and remuneration to the hundreds of young girls who are forced to work for a miserable wage under conditions which would not be otherwise tolerated.
