BOARD OF CONCILIATION FOR BROTHERHOOD OF R. R. EMPLOYEES

Ottawa, July 25.—A board of conciliation has been granted by the labor department under the industrial act, to the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad employees, in response to an application which touches a new field of railroad, the binding together of railway clerks, baggagemen and freight handlers, truckers and checkers into one organization akin to that of men and telegraphers now belong.

HON. FRANK COCHRANE NOW IN REGINA

Mooselaw, July 25.—Today, Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, was the guest of the Canadian Club at luncheon in the Empress hotel, a stirring address as chief spokesman for the railway city.

Mr. Cochrane delivered a comprehensive sketch of Dominion potentialities and their corresponding needs as regards Saskatchewan he said: "I am receiving deputations every day from farmers who are raising as much as 5,000 bushels of wheat and have to haul it sixty miles. That," said the minister, "will have to be changed."

Referring to his intended journey to Norway House, Port Nelson and Fort Churchill, Mr. Cochrane said:

"If the nature of the country is anything like the reports we have received about it, then I can assure you that the railway to the Hudson Bay is worth building anyway. The navigability of Hudson Strait is a contestable point as it has been reported on only the most favorable conditions. But it is proposed by us to establish wireless stations on both sides and navigate the ships through the ice, and there is no reason to doubt that with this system the navigation of straits is possible and perfectly safe."

Later in the afternoon the minister was waited upon by the city council and board of trade with regard to the Grand Trunk Pacific entry into the city. Mr. Cochrane said that he had been urging the company to expedite matters and further promised that he would personally do all in his power to hurry their project.

With regard to the Canadian Northern line, Calgary to Regina, a very strong case was made out locally as well as for the extensions into the south country. The minister called for a map and fully entered into the issues spoken of. He was impressed with the minister's words and asked for still fuller data. The Grand Trunk line from the city would, he said, cross the Saskatchewan river at Riverside, instead of at Eyebrow.

Hon. Frank Cochrane left at 4 p.m. on the Winnipeg local.
