

Henry Stuart, Lord Darnley, was amas_ sinated and then blown up in his palace. Mary Stuart was beheaded in England.

James I, of England and VI of Scotland died, not without suspicion of being poison-

ed by Lord Buckingham. Charles I, was beheaded at White-Ilall. Charles II, was exiled for many years. James II, lost his crown, and died in panishment.

Ann, after a reign which though glorious was rendered unhappy by party dis-putes, died of a broken heart, occasioned by the quarrels of her fatourite sertunts. The posterity of Jarties liave temained wretched wanderers in loreign lands. The Year 88 has also been for several
