Keep cream sweet till 24 hours before churning; then warm up to about 64° in summer, 68° to 70° in winter. When cream is well ripened cool down to about 58° in summer, 64° to 68° in winter, and churff. Wash butter in the churn, when in the granular state. Procure a lever butter washer if possible, and wash the butter twice if it is to be kept any length of time. Use from half an ounce to one ounce per pound, as the market demands. Pack well in tubs or crocks and cover with a salt plaster.
