self in his master's house, and after mid night creep into the parlors and play the same airs with which his young mistres, had entertained her guests a few hours be fore, being cautious to suppress his notes by placing his foot on the "soft" pedal He was soon detected, however in this innomarvelous powers, encouraged him to play on all occasions by stealth. But his genius became so manifest that his master found
