WORK AND WAGES.

Detroit Cigarmakers Will Go Back to

Detroit, May 5 .- The probability of a settlement of the strike of the cigarmakers at the Banner factory has been realized, and the strikers will return to work tomorrow morning, upon assurances that the foreman, Edward Grey, will be given other employment. The firm also promises to reinstate the girls who walked out, pay them the same wages for the same work as the men, and recognize their right to belong to a union. The firm assures the union that it desires its employes to have the same freedom of speech that is enjoyed by the workmen in other factories. The mass meeting at German Salesmen's Hall last evening was more in the nature of a jollification over the result of the strike, and the \$1,000 recently appropriated from the treasury to aid the cause will be covered back. Charles Erb, however, will be allowed \$600 with which to make a campaign throughout the State in the interest of

the blue label. Members of the Plasterers' Union last night discussed the situation in their trade at the Trades Council Hall. They set out to demand \$3 50 a day during the coming season, but the bosses have impressed them with the statement that it would be impossible for them to pay more than \$3, owing to the figures at which they have taken contracts. Some of the men are, therefore, in favor of accepting the \$3 rate for eight hours. The matter will finally be determined at the next regular meeting of the

Toronto, May 5.—The wages of the laborers employed on the new civic buildings have with the consent of the men been reduced from 21 to 18 cents an hour. The reduction takes effect on Monday. Negotiations are now pending for a

cut in the wages of bricklayers from 36 to about 33 cents. Until these negotiations are completed no bricklayers will be put on the work. Toronto, May 5.—The difficulty between the Builders' Exchange and the members of the building trades unions has been finally settled. The Bricklayers' Union and their bosses were in conference all yesterday afternoon, and it was given out at the

conclusion of the meeting that the old wage of 36 cents per hour would be paid the men for one year. The Builders' Laborers at their mass meeting held last evening in Temperance Hall decided to accept the offer made by the Exchange of 18 cents per hour. This agreement will also stand for one year. Last year's wage was 21 cents per hour. The stonemasons have been holding meetings daily, but as there is little work of this class this season, it is probable that the bosseswill also pay them last year's wage of 36 cents.

THE POLYCLOT PETITION

Representing the Attestations of 7,500,000 Persons

In Favor of Prohibiting the Traffic in Liquor and Opium-Unique Programme of the Promoters.

Washington, D. C., May 5.-A series of meetings which commenced at Washington in February last will be resumed in London in the week beginning June The World's Women's Christian Temperance Union has for some years been organizing a gigantic polyglot petition in 50 different languages, which has now been signed by over 2,000,000 people, and with the attestations of certain large societies represent 7,500,000 persons. It asks for the prohibition of the sale of alcohol and opium by the different civilized Governments. petition is mounted on over a mile of canvas.

In concert with Lady Somerset and Miss Willard, who presented the petition to President Cleveland last February, Rev. Dr. Lunn has chartered the steamer Berlin, of the American Line, for the conveyance of the American contingent, and the petition itself, which will occupy several large cases. Arrangements have already been made for 250 women preachers and speakers to address the same number of audiences

in London on Sunday, June 16. A unique demontration will take place in the Albert Hall on Tuesday, Jan. 18, when the polyglot petition will be festooned around the hall, to be presented to the representatives of the British

After the London convention the delegates will proceed to Grindelwald, where a temperance convention is being organized by Dr. Lunn to be addressed by Lady Henry Somerset, Mrs. Joseph-ine Butler, Miss Willard and other lead-ers of women's movements.

In August it is proposed to visit the northern capitals of Europe. A steamer will be chartered to convey the petition and the delegates to Christiania, Stockholm, Copenhagen and St. Petersburg. In the late autumn the delegates will continue their crusade, a third vessel being secured to carry the delegates and their polyglot petition to various countries on the Mediterranean, includ-ing Italy Greece Turkey the Holy Land

and Egypt. At a later period it is intended to visit the central capitals in Europe, India and other Asiatic countries, Australia

THE GOLD CURE SECRET.

Milwaukee, May 5.-Judge Seaman, of the United States Court, yesterday granted a permanent injunction re-straining Dr. Leslie E. Keeley from re-vealing the formula of the Keeley gold cure. 


