DRAWN TO DEATH.

Fatality to a Farmer Near St. Thomas.

—A Runaway Team.

St. Thomas, Aug. 1.—David Clark, who came to this part of Ontario from the vicinity of the town of Stayner last spring and rented a farm from Mr. Humphrey about four miles west of this city, which he has been working, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon. It appears that he and his hired man were working in the woods with a spirited team of horses, which became frightened and turned suddenly, upsetting the wagon. Mr. Clark was thrown underneath and dragged for a considerable distance. When found life was extinct. He leaves a wife and five children.

—Vital statistics for July: Forty-seven births, 26 deaths, 32 marriages.

—Mrs. Henry Selman, of South London, leaves for Chicago on Thursday morning.

—Mr. J. R. Jaynes and family have gone to Grand Bend for a month's sojourn.

—The Dean of Huron has left for a trip to Charlotte Lake, near the Thousand Islands.

—Mr. Henry Thompson, of the Dominion annual, is one of the judges at the World's Fair Scottish section.

—Mr. Hardwick, of New Brunswick, left to-day via the C. P. R. for the World's Fair, after a visit with friends here.

—Miss Martha Allison, of Windsor, daughter of G. T. R. Conductor Allison, is the guest of Miss Tomlinson, Clarence street.

—Fire broke out again in a pile of shavings at Watson's box factory Monday night. It was put out without the aid of the fire department.

—Miss Stryker, of Philadelphia, has been the guest of Rev. Mr. Seabrook here, and returned via the C. P. R. yesterday by way of the World's Fair.

—Misses Mildred and Maud Garfat have left on the steamer Flora for Cleveland on an extended visit to their aunt, Mrs. C. C. Cottrell, of Willoughby, Ohio.

—Mr. Wm. Elmer, of the C. P. R. barber shop, caught a bass seventeen inches long in the Thames near the Hellmuth College Monday. It was one among a string of fine fish.

—Mr. B. G. Clappitt, of Colborne street, while riding machinery in motion Monday afternoon at his stable, had the little finger of the right hand so badly crushed that it had to be severed from the hand.

—Judge Elliot yesterday gave his decision in the appealed Dobie-Hunter case.

—He could not interpose with the verdict of the jury when they allowed Dobie \$145 and costs, and therefore discharged the defendant's application with costs.

—Bart Wolfe, who has been an inmate of the asylum for 16 months, escaped yesterday. He is about 60 years of age, and is 5 feet, 7 inches in height. He is smooth shaven, with the exception of a gray moustache. When last seen he was dressed in a suit of darkish hue, and wore a soft felt hat.

—Miss Bessie Westlake, daughter of Mr. Wm. Westlake, of Plymouth, England, and formerly a resident of London, was married at Baljeauville, Sask. N. W. T., on July 30, to Mr. Hugh Richardson, postmaster, Battleford, son of Judge Richardson, Regina, and brother of Mrs. C. O. Ermatinger, St. Thomas.

—Many Londoners will remember Prof. J. H. Johnston, one of the first educators in Hellmuth College, who came from Ireland over half a century ago. Prof. Johnston is dead, but Mrs. Johnston has for years lived in Toronto and has been a power in philanthropic work. She has now resolved to go to Chicago and live. In that city a number of her sons occupy prominent positions.

—Mr. Sherlock's son, Stanley street, was kicked in the head by a playful horse in the stable yard yesterday. He is recovering, but the wound is serious and painful bruise on the forehead and over the ear. His face is considerably discolored and swollen, but Dr. Ferguson, who is in attendance, thinks that no serious or permanent injury will result.

—The young people have been to meetings, and presumably all are productive of some good. But there seems to be one meeting held occasionally in South London that is the germinal of more evil than any other.

—Adjoining at a very late hour after most people are peacefully slumbering, some of the members make night hideous with their howls and warwhoops along the Witley road. Monday night many of these were already in dreamland were rudely awakened by the most unearthly yells and whoops, suggestive of murders innumerable and atrocious burglaries, or worse, which are far from being appreciated by peaceful citizens longing for sleep and finding none.

To-day is the date of the Irish Benevolent Society's picnic. It is hardly necessary to call public attention to it because nearly everybody knows it. It is always one of the biggest affairs of the season, and at this afternoon is the business half-holiday, the attendance may eclipse that of former years if possible. Ald. J. W. Jones on His Travels.

The Alderman says they enjoyed the trip immensely. At Duluth he inspected the method of laying block-paving, which he considers superior to that generally pursued. A foot and a half of broken road metal is placed on the streets and rolled flat, and on this the cedar blocks are rolled. The foundation was an excellent one, and Ald. Jones saw the whole blocks of streets laid in this manner, which were as flat as a billiard table. At Port Arthur Ex-Water Commissioner Muirhead was met. He has for two years been C. P. R. station master there, and seems to like it. J. H. Fraser, barrister, was also tarrying there. He says there is great fishing in that locality. It is a common thing to catch trout six pounds in weight.

Whether in the latter event, the road could not be run by compressed—or suppressed—wind, apparently expected to be the policy of the railway board.

Whether the Young Liberal picnic at Queen's Park Aug. 9, will not be something unusually good.

The Police Court.

Gibbs, the alleged attempted seducer of little girls, charged with vagrancy, was remanded for a week by the police magistrate yesterday, pending search by the police for evidence on a more serious charge.

Leonard W. Crawford was charged with assault by Benjamin Harris. It appears that the former, after having a hotly worded conversation with Harris, struck him across the face twice. Blood flowed profusely from his mouth. The accused was fined \$2. The magistrate also warned Harris to be more classical and less offensive in the use of adjectives in the future.

The charge against Richard Ardell and Frederick Rockett of keeping a livery without a license was withdrawn.

Duncan Cameron, James McGregor and John Seagrow, an evidence given showed, were begging, drunk and disorderly. The last mentioned, who has only one leg, was able to appeal to the pity of citizens better than the other two, and therefore did most of the begging. Among others he had the temerity to ask Judge Williams for some money to buy a bed. The chief's tender emotions in this instance did not reach to his pocket. The magistrate ordered that the three prisoners be marched out of town.

The War is Over.

Yesterday, then, the street railway forces, under command of General Brier, and ably assisted by Col. Smith and Major Raycraft, reconnoitred on Dundas street west. They came out of ambush with war material in plenty, apparently expecting to meet the civic forces at or near the scene of battle of two weeks ago. Surprise beyond measure was depicted on the countenances of the combatants when they found the enemy nowhere. It is true that the civic forces had carried off a portion of the spoils in the previous fight, but they had taken no care to entrench themselves for future resistance, and the street railway promptly took possession of the field and proceeded to fortify themselves by extending their works in the manner originally intended. It has been hinted that the solicitor-general in the civic administration, prior to leaving the scene a few days ago, was as positive as to the position assumed by the civic commander-in-chief when he ordered the head of the engineering corps (Gen. Graydon) to tear up the street railway works. The one thing apparent is that the street railway corps had the field to themselves, and that the civic forces, if they were in the vicinity, kept under cover. The switch, it seems, will be built.

And, if appearances are not deceitful, the taxpayers of the city will have to pay a war indemnity.
