#### TIRED OF WRITS.

Councilor Moore, of London West, Decidedly Angry

At Being Threatened with Newspaper Writs, and Demands Satisfaction -Electric Line to the

At last night's meeting of the London West Council, Councilor Moore mentioned the fact that during the eighteen months he had been on the board he had been threatened with no less than five writs through the columns of the Free Press. Lately that paper had seen fit to make another threat in the Nicholls case, and unless they retracted what they said then he would at once take the necessary steps to make them. He did his duty to the best of his ability; had no personal feeling against Mr. Nicholls, and he did not propose to be

scandalized with newspaper threats of writs. The reeve said that on May 28 a writ was issued against Mr. Nicholls for the recovery of the amount in dispute. "And there may be stronger proceedings yet taken in the matter," said Mr. Macdonald.


