

THE MANITOULIN MAN HAS DISAPPEARED
AND HIS COUNSEL CAN'T ACCOUNT FOR IT

Gamey Has Not Been Seen Since Saturday Afternoon and All Efforts to Locate Him Have Been Fruitless.

His Lawyers in a Quandary Consider Throwing Up the Case, But Court Agrees to Wait Until Thursday.

He Told Hotel Clerk He Was Going Away on a Visit.

TOOK HIS BAGGAGE WITH HIM

The Defense Had All Outgoing Trains Watched, But Their Efforts Were in Vain.

Toronto, April 21.—A dramatic turn was given the Gamey trial this morning. The report that Gamey had disappeared filled the courtroom with an excited crowd. At ten o'clock nothing had been heard of the man from Manitoulin, and a hurried consultation was held between counsel and the judges in the ante-room. When the latter took their seats at 10:15, Mr. Blake, senior counsel for the prosecution, arose amid painful suspense. He admitted that Mr. Gamey's absence could not

be accounted for. If this investigation was simply a matter as between Mr. Gamey and the defendants, it might be proper for Mr. Gamey's counsel to withdraw from the case. "But we feel," continued Mr. Blake, "that it is not a question between Gamey and others, but an investigation in the interests of the public, and we desire to place ourselves entirely in the hands of your lordships in that respect. If it were an ordinary trial, that would end the proceedings. If you think it is only a matter of Mr. Gamey and that you are not bound by other considerations, we shall withdraw."

Chancellor Boyd, in reply, said he did not regard the case as a private prosecution, but it was a matter, as stated in the statute, which pertained to the good of the country. "It is a matter of public concern, and the commission will have authority to direct that counsel in this case be maintained, and have an opportunity to present it to the best advantage. It would be a misfortune if, on account of the unexplained absence of the person whom we call the prosecutor, Mr. Blake and his colleagues should drop out of the case."

It would leave us in that difficulty that we ourselves should have to direct some counsel to take it up. Mr. Blake

and his colleagues can conduct the inquiry with more efficiency and promptitude. They are in a position to do it much better than anyone else."

MORE PROSECUTION WITNESSES.

Mr. Blake said the prosecution had two more witnesses, probably three, and then the investigation of the bank books. Chancellor Boyd proposed that the court adjourn until Thursday, when these witnesses could be heard. That would close the case for the prosecution and would give the defense time to get ready.

Mr. Johnston, counsel for the defense,

said he quite agreed with Mr. Blake. It was not reasonable to take the position he had taken. "I am very glad, indeed, that your lordships have taken this view with reference to the position which Mr. Blake should assume towards the further investigation of this case. We feel it should be investigated, and we are ready to facilitate it in every possible way. We shall see that the court loses nothing by the adjournment until Thursday."

GAMEY'S SUPPORTERS CRESTFALLEN.

The witnesses spoken of by Mr. Blake are Frank Sullivan's father-in-law and wife, who are expected to tell that Sullivan was boasting about his deal with Stratton and Gamey. It is a great surprise that the prosecution has no evidence to offer, as it was supposed they had scores of witnesses. Gamey's disappearance is the sensation of the hour. It is not believed he will show up, as he would have to account for the missing leaf of the cash book in Crossin's factory, and for the forgery of the teller's initials on the bank deposit slip. The opponents of the Government are entirely crestfallen. From the bank, it is claimed that when Gamey got the original bank deposit slip from the teller of the Ontario Bank on Saturday last he made two other copies, which he has now made into the first one being refused, Gamey having retained the original and signed the teller's initials.

LATER.

LAST HONORS TO DEAD STATESMAN

Official Announcement of Lieut.-Governor's Funeral.

MANY MESSAGES OF SYMPATHY

A Eulogy From Quebec's Premier, Who Will Attend the Obsequies In Person.

Toronto, April 21.—Out of consideration for the general public the three hours during which the remains of the late Lieutenant-Governor will lie in state at Government House today have been changed from 2 to 5, as at last announced, to 5 to 8. Otherwise the official announcement made on Sunday will be adhered to. Tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock the service at Government House will be commenced and will be conducted by Rev. W. Caven, D.D., LL.D., Rev. Prof. MacLaren, D.D., Rev. A. Gander, B.D., and Rev. Armstrong Black, D.D., Rev. Principal Caven will be the speaker.

FUNERAL PROCESSION.

The funeral of His Honor the late Lieutenant-Governor will take place at 3 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, previous to which, at 2 o'clock, a short service will be held at Government House. The body will lie in state from 5 to 8 o'clock in the evening on Tuesday (in place of from 2 to 5, as previously stated) and from 10:30 in the morning to 12:30 on Wednesday, for the convenience of those coming from a distance.

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL WILL BE REPRESENTED BY MAJOR MAWAT.

Representatives of the Scottish societies met yesterday and decided to call upon their members to attend the funeral in a body.

The public schools will be closed tomorrow afternoon.

The military band that was to have been tendered the Earl of Dundonald tonight has been postponed till some time next month, but the general will be in Toronto and will attend the funeral officially.

QUEBEC'S SYMPATHY.

The following telegram was received by Premier Ross yesterday: "Quebec, April 20.—Lieutenant-Governor will attend funeral of late Sir Oliver Mowat, Major Sheppard, A.D.C."

Premier Ross also received the following telegram from the Hon. S. N. Parent, Premier of Quebec: "I am desirous to convey to you, on behalf of the Government of the Province of Quebec, the expression of their share of the grief into which the sister province of Ontario is plunged at this moment, by the loss of its distinguished head, Sir Oliver Mowat."

And to offer you their tribute of admiration for the statesman, who is identified with the political history of Canada as one of the fathers of Confederation, and who was Prime Minister of the Province of Ontario for nearly thirty years, and has just closed his career in the post of honor as the representative of his Most Gracious Majesty in the office of Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, and we pray you to transmit the expression of our deepest sympathy and heartfelt condolence to the members of Sir Oliver Mowat's family."

From Lord Minto to Miss Mowat: "Ottawa, April 19.—Please accept sincerest sympathy in irreparable loss to you and the country from Lady Minto and myself."

SIR OLIVER'S FUNERAL

Suggestion That Middlesex Liberal Association Should Attend.

S. A. BARRACKS BURNED

Quarters at Listowel Destroyed by Incendiarism.

Listowel, Ont., April 21.—A fire broke out in the Salvation Army barracks here early this morning, completely demolishing the building. From all appearances the building was set on fire, as the army had no fire in it from the Sunday previous. The building was owned by J. W. Scott, and insured in the Waterloo Mutual for \$500. Fortunately the Salvation Army have their new barracks near completion.

REINSTATE OLD EMPLOYEES.

Philadelphia, April 21.—An order has been issued by the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company, which operates several collieries in the Panther Creek Valley, reinstating all of its old employees who have been idle since the strike. About 200 men and boys whose positions had been filled will find work in and about the mines.

ILLINOIS COAL FIELDS

Jim Hill's Big Corporation to Control Them.

Chicago, April 21.—The Tribune today says that Vast coal fields in Central Illinois are to pass to the control of a corporation with a capital of \$80,000,000. They will be operated in connection with the Hill system of railroads. President Hill is said to have financed the deal, and the Burlington, the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific Railroads will open markets for Illinois fuel in the Northwest. The territory acquired extends through 40 miles of the richest coal lands in the state, and is traversed by the Jacksonville and St. Louis Railroad, owned by the Burlington.

A PARACHUTIST INJURED.

Houston, Texas, April 21.—Professor Leroy Fever, an aeronaut, has met with a serious accident before thousands of spectators here. He made a successful ascension of 3,000 feet and cut loose with his parachute. On its downward flight, one of the ropes snapped, the balloonist lost his hold and fell 150 feet from the ground. He struck in a soft sough, many bones were broken, but it is believed he will recover.

FIRE ENGINE AS BURGLAR CATCHER

Under Cover of Steam Police Get Their Man.

WAS PERCHED IN CHURCH TOWER

Armed With Lightning Rod He Kept Officers at Bay Until Water Reached Him.

Bridgeport, Conn., April 21.—After an all-night siege the police, with the aid of the fire department, this morning, captured a supposed burglar who had taken refuge on the cupola above the roof of St. Patrick's parochial residence, 60 feet from the street. The man defied arrest when his presence on the roof was discovered at 10 o'clock last night, and after an officer, who mounted a ladder, had received severe blows on the head from a section of lightning rod which the man used, it was decided to wait until daylight before making further sorties.

At intervals during the night, while the police maintained their guard around the building, the man could be heard for several blocks, and kept the whole neighborhood aroused.

At daybreak when it became possible to get a view of the fellow, there were 2,000 people around the building. To assist in the capture, the police sent for a hose wagon, and a stream from a hydrant was directed at the man. This, however, had little effect, for he merely laughed and brandished his club like a maniac when the water hit him.

A fire engine was then brought up. Under cover of its powerful stream, five policemen succeeded in reaching the roof. Even then the capture was effected by a hand-to-hand struggle lasting half an hour. The man was

ALBANIAN OUTRAGES

They Murder Judges Appointed by the Powers.

Salonica, European Turkey, April 21.—A band of about 500 insurgents, partly in Bulgarian uniform, was defeated by a Turkish force near Radovitz, April 19. Thirty insurgents and nine Turks were killed.

The Konieh, Asia Minor, division of Redifs, numbering sixteen battalions, has been called out for active service in Macedonia and Albania. The new judges, appointed under the reform scheme of the powers, are being terrorized by the Albanians. Two of the judges were shot with revolvers in the streets of Scutari, Asia Minor. One was killed.

ALBANIANS THREATEN SERVANS

AND WANT SULTAN TO HELP

The Lives of Russian and Servian Consuls Are Openly Menaced.

London, Tuesday, April 21.—A dispatch to the Times from Uskub, under date of April 18, confirms the statement that the Sultan's peace commission remains at Ipek, but does not confirm the report that the members are forcibly detained. KILLED HIS FATHER

Because the Latter Was Abusing His Mother.

Clinton, Mass., April 21.—Thomas Smith, who was assaulted last night by his 17-year-old son Walter, died today. The boy, who surrendered to the police, is said to have made a statement to the chief admitting that he attacked his father with an axe. There had been trouble in the family for some time, he said. After the father had been particularly abusive to the lad's mother last night, Walter said he seized an axe and followed him into the street, where he struck him three times

and the father fell, mortally wounded, and the boy went to the police station, where he surrendered.

Framemakers Resume Work.

Chicago, April 21.—Two thousand picture frame makers, who went on strike a month ago for better wages and shorter hours, have decided to return to work, pending arbitration of their demands.

Policy Players Punished.

New York, April 21.—Justice Scott in the supreme court today sentenced Albert J. Adams to not less than one year and not more than one year and nine months in Sing Sing, and to pay a fine of \$1,000 for having perjured himself for playing policy in his possession.

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
