LABOR PARTY PLATFORM

Object of the New Local Political Organization.

Niembers Must Forswear Allegiance to Old Parties.

Ald. Dreaney's Interest in McLean Investigation-Inspection of Police Station.

The object of the Labor party of London, which the Trades and Labor Council has decided shall be formed in this city is "to study economic subjects affecting the welfare of labor and to promulgate information regarding the same; to secure for the useful producer the wealth resulting from the application of labor to natural resources, and as a chief means to that end to elect representatives from our own ranks on the governing bodies of the country." According to the constitution which has been adopted, "any person may become a member of party who is in sympathy with its principles, and who is willing to forswear allegiance to the existing political parties known as Liberal and Conservative: provided that three-fourths of the members of the party shall be wage-earners." All candidates for membership must be proposed and seconded by members of the party. The pledge to which all members of the party must subscribe before being admitted to the rights of membership shall declare that the applicant for membership forswears allegiance to the existing political parties, and would, as long as he remained a memrancs 50 centimes. ber, support by his influence and vote BREMEN. The members of the board of education and all labor men are interestedly awaiting the next meeting of the Trades and Labor Council, when School Trustee McLean will be given an opportunity to answer the charge against him, that he withdrew from the election contest upon the promise that he would be given a seat at the board by the city council. Some of the members of the Trades and Labor Council feel very strongly about this matter, basing their opinion upon the evidence now at hand; but, of course, Mr. McLean's side of the case has not yet been heard, and when it is, the situation may be altered. As it stands at present, however, leaders of labor say that a convincing case against Mr. McLean exists unless he can give testimony to refute it. They say that Ald. Dreaney was interested in the matter, and that they have a statement from him to the effect that he was instrumental in securing Mr. McLean's withdrawal from the contest, promising him that he would be appointed a trustee by the city council. He did this, he said, with the belief that by so doing he would help the labor party.

The mayor and city engineer inspected the police station this morning. The result was that they are now of the opinion that it would be wise to reconstruct entirely its interior. THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

School Text-Books the Subject of an Animated Debate-Mr. Whitney Said That Witnesses Gave False Testimony Before the Commission.

Toronto, Jan. 30 .- Quite unexpectedly an innocent-looking motion on yesterday's order paper at the legislature provoked the liveliest debate of the session thus far. It was a call from Col. Matheson for copies of the evidence taken before the royal commission on school text books, whose report was presented in 1898. The member for South Lanark made

this the basis for a general attack on the present school books of the province and the conditions under which they were issued. Hon. Mr. Harcourt, minister of education, replied in a telling speech, fully custaining his reputation for alertness when his department is attacked. Mr. Whitney, in vigorous terms,

made bold to say that it would be found that witnesses had given false evidence before the royal commission. This statement was earnestly challenged by the premier, who closed the discussion, and who quoted figures to show that our text-books were the cheapest on the continent.

Earlier in the afternoon Dr. Jes-sop's bill providing for a reconstitution of the Medical Council was referred to a special committee. The budget debate will be resumed today by Mr. Lucas, and it is expected to conclude by the middle of next week.

It was very thick on the bay, however, and the ships in the harbor moved very slowly. 500 PASSENGERS IN PERIL.
