been such an interest in the Jewish

people manifested as at the present time. Though their distinctive nalife has been lost they have nevertheless impressed themselves upon the world in every sphere of existence, and are making themselves felt as an influence more and more every It is not to be wondered then that a hearty reception has been given in the literary world to a new work that is being issued by Messrs. Funk & Wagnalls, of New York, entitled The Jewish Encyclopedia." Already four volumes have been printed, and they are fulfilling the claims on their behalf made by the publishers. It is evident that no expense is being spared to make them the most complete works of the kind extant. Volume IV. has just come to hand, and for the literary merit of its articles, the letter type, and artistic plates, it deserves the highest praise. Some idea of the magnitude of the work may be gained when it is known that 173 scholars have aided in the composition of this volume alone, some of whom are the most distinguished men in their departments of literature. While many of the articles are for the scholar and the specialist, the great majority in volume are of general interest, and several have a particular bearing on the relation of Christianity to Judaism. Such articles as "Covenant," "Circumcision," "Crucifixion," "Demonology," and others of equal value and interest will be found profitable reading for those who desire to trace the origin, growth and development of the Christian religion. As in the pre-vious volumes, the field of history, biography, philosophy, law and theo logy is well covered. Special attention might be called to articles on "Cochin Jews," which describes the black Jews of China; "Costumes," to which is attached splendidly artistic plates of Jewish dress in different countries and ages of the world, and the "Dreyfus Case," giving a clear and impartial account of this wonderful trial. eems invidious to select these articles from so many admirable ones, but their perusal will help us to value the


