ONE FOR MASCAGNI
Scores a Point in the Fight With His
Managers.

Boston, Feb. 27.—The question of
jurisdiction in connection with the
contracts of Pietro Mascagni, the
Italian composer, was passed upon
today by the full bench of the Su-
preme Court yesterday, and the deci-
sion is that any difference or questions
between Mascagni and his concert
managers must be acted upon by the
civil authorities of Florence, Italy, as
per the contract between the parties.

CZAR TO THE RESCUE
Is Making Great Efforts to Relieve
Stricken Finland.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 27.—The czar
has personally intervened in behalf of
the famine-stricken Finns, and has or-
dered that extensive relief works be
started without delay. Besides the
immediate construction of the proposed
Idensalmi-Kayana railroad, which will
cost \$700,000, his majesty has sanc-
tioned the expenditure of \$300,000 on
the Uusaborg-Tornio railway, which
the Senate, but hitherto unapproved,
the raising of a \$2,000,000 loan for
other railroad construction, the estab-
lishment of a bank with a capital of
\$800,000, and the use of the funds in
making loans to peasant farmers, and
has approved an appropriation of
\$140,000 for public works, principally
the raising of swamps. It is the
belief the proposed relief works will
employ the majority of the able-bodied
and that consequently the voluntary
committees' responsibilities will be light.

New York, Feb. 27.—Dr. R. J. Gatling,
the inventor of the Gatling gun, died in
this city yesterday afternoon at the home
of his son, Hugh O. Pentecost. He was
55 years old.

Cape Haytien, Hayti, Feb. 27.—Ad-
vices received here today from Puerto
Plata, Santo Domingo, say three re-
volutionary generals are operating
successfully in the northwestern part
of Santo Domingo, and that General
Rodriguez is advancing on the capital,
San Domingo.

HON. E. J. DAVIS' BIG VICTORY

He More Than Doubts His Ma-
jority of May Last.

CLARK WINS IN CENTER BRUCE

Anti-Prohibition Men Were Actively
Opposed to Dr. Stewart's
Election.

Toronto, Feb. 27.—Hon. E. J. Davis,
Liberal majority, 449. Majority over
same opponent in general election, 207.
Major Clark, Conservative, ma-
jority 52. Majority over same op-
ponent in general election, 5.

The party standing is 52 Liberals,
including Mr. Ganey, of Manitoulin,
to succeed the Liberalism in the North
York campaign, and the majority
of 207 in May last has been more than
doubled. The increase was general all
over the constituency, but was more
particularly noticeable in Mr. Davis' own
polling subdivision, where Mr.
Davis' majority was increased from 94
to 126, and in the town of Aurora, the
home of the Liberalism, where the
converted an adverse majority of 43 to
a majority of 8 for Mr. Davis. This
turnover in Aurora is a significant fea-
ture of the campaign, and would seem
to indicate that the Conservative candi-
date's campaign of personalities did not
find favor in his own town. It also
aroused Davis' neighbors, and caused
them to return no uncertain verdict
of disapproval. In Newmarket the
Liberal majority is normally 100. In
May last the 123 given for Davis was
quite abnormal, and surprised the
Liberals quite as much as it did the
Conservatives. Tonight Newmarket
registered 104 for Davis, and the Lib-
erals have reason to feel ashamed.

King township increased its majority
for Davis from 90 in May last to 167.
Whitechurch advanced from 64 to 93.
North Gwillimbury gave Lennox 31 in
May, and 51 in February. In Aurora
Davis' majority was increased from 43
to 84. In White Sutton, which gave
Lennox 46 at the general election, gave
him 28 today.

THE PROTEST SETTLED.
Mr. Davis spent the day around
King and went to Newmarket on the
evening train. When the result was
known he was escorted to the town
hall from the residence of Mayor
Cane by a torchlight procession, the
carriage of the mayor being pulled by
the hands of his friends. It was fully ten
minutes before the crowd in the hall,
which included hundreds of ladies, felt
that they had reached the town hall.
Mr. Davis' remarks consisted
largely of happy commentary on the
returns. He commenced by jocularly
remarking that "the protest was set-
tled" and that he was glad to see

subjected.
