BURIED WRONG BODY

Man Found His Wife Alive—Sued For Burial Expenses.

New York, May 31.—Ignacio Valente brought suit for \$50 against the city of New York, in the Yorkville municipal court, for expenses incurred in burying the body of a woman supposed to be his wife. Valente was found that his wife was still alive.

Conchetta Valente, his wife, was sent to the Metropolitan Hospital, where she was found by Superintendent Merwin, of the department of police charities, announcing the death of his wife, and advising him to go to the morgue for the body if he wished to give it burial in a coffin. Valente, who had been asked to see the body. An attendant pointed to a box on which was tucked a card and the man came running to see that of his wife.

"I wanted to have a look at my wife, but the attendant said it would be better for me not to, as she was very much changed, and it would make me feel bad, the burial said."

He made arrangements to have the body buried quietly, and he was told that the body was that of his wife. Neither he nor his friends looked at the body. A day later, after he had been told that the body was that of his wife, he found his wife alive and well.

"Why don't you go to see your wife, a good husband should," his friend asked.

"Poor Conchetta! I buried her three days ago, and now I'm so lonesome," Valente responded.

"How could you bury her? I saw her yesterday, and she was crying her eyes out because you neglected her and will not go to see her. She's all right, and no more crazy," the man explained.

Valente hastened to the hospital and found his wife there, as his friend had informed him. The physicians pronounced her cured, and the husband took her home.

Former Magistrate Wentworth put in a claim against the city at the comptroller's office for the expenses incurred by the man. The comptroller refused payment and the suit resulted.

Justice Joseph said that inasmuch as the Metropolitan Hospital is a state institution the city could not be sued for the alleged mistake, and dismissed the action without prejudice.

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HICKS' PREDICTS SHOWERY JUNE

Thunderstorms and High Winds Will Also Prevail.

NOT ENOUGH RAIN FOR CROPS

A Series of Storm Periods Slated for the Month by the St. Louis Expert.

Rev. H. R. Hicks, of St. Louis, has issued his forecasts for the approaching month of June, extracts from which follow:

A reactionary period of disturbance is central on the 1st and 2nd days of June, calling for higher temperature falling barometer, increased humidity and progressive storms of wind, rain and thunder from the 1st to about the 3rd. Rising barometer, change to westerly winds, clearing and cooler weather to follow the storm.

Western extremes will begin to feel the growing influence of the Vulcan storm period as early as the 4th and 5th. This period will be characterized by extending from the 4th to the 9th. This period will begin with change to much warmer in western sections, the barometer will fall to storm ready, and rising temperature, falling barometer and storms of rain, wind and thunder from about the 6th to the 9th. On and touching Tuesday, the 7th, these disturbances will be at their greatest.

North Sydney, C. B., May 31.—Dr. Geo. H. Parkin, of Toronto, an educational expert, who is in charge of the Rhodes scholarship arrangements in America, announced yesterday that a difficulty which had arisen in Newfoundland over the payment of students had been adjusted. Dr. Parkin stated that compensation had been reached under which Newfoundland boys would be permitted to compete for the Rhodes scholarships.

DECORATION DAY

Mr. Roosevelt Addresses Thousands on Field of Gettysburg.

Gettysburg, Pa., May 31.—On historic Cemetery Hill, and in the presence of a concourse of thousands, who had assembled to pay tribute to the memory of the nation's dead, President Roosevelt yesterday delivered the principal Decoration Day address. The President was escorted to the cemetery on the battlefield by a body of several hundred veterans of the civil war. He and his special escort were preceded by several military organizations, and the rear of the procession consisted of civic organizations and citizens in carriages. Gov. Pennypacker presided at the ceremonies, which were held in the rotunda of the cemetery. After the memorial day services of the G. A. R. had been concluded, and the pupils of the public schools had strewn flowers over the graves of the thousands of dead, during which ceremony the Marine Band played a solemn dirge. Rev. Dr. Hale, chaplain of the United States Senate, pronounced the invocation. The President was then introduced by Gov. Pennypacker, and was accorded an enthusiastic reception.

gusts, and drenching downpours of rain, up from points of the compass from which rains do not ordinarily come. Clouds that have passed to the east often whirl suddenly backward unexpected, surprising and overwhelming unwary localities with wind and torrents from easterly directions. Instead of the usual order—coming up from westerly points of the compass—many of our hardest rains strike from easterly or southeasterly directions during the solstice period. Fact of the matter is, barometric depressions are detached and scattered into narrow segregated localities, and these atmospheric well-holes constitute vacuums into which the nearest passing air is sure to rush, no matter from what direction.

"In the nature of things, June will bring many showers and occasional heavy rains, to most sections, but we do not believe that the rainfalls will come up to the average, taking the season as a whole. This means, of course, that some sections will have a shortage of moisture before the close of the month."

As to the seasonal conditions during the summer months, we will say that a Mars period dominates the last half of July, and that the character of rainfall and weather generally will be expected generally through July and August. We fear that there will be a shortage of moisture or much of the great grain-producing sections of our country.

KEEPERS FIGHT ELEVEN PYTHONS

Entered Snake Cage to Administer Spring Medicine—

Two Badly Hurt.

New York, May 30.—The story of a battle between eleven pythons and three keepers in the snake cage at the Central Park menagerie was told today at the Arsenal. The struggle took place this morning, and one of the keepers, Jacob Cook, had the thumb of his right hand bitten to the bone by an infuriated snake. H. K. Shannon, another keeper, who had run to rescue Cook, was caught in twelve feet of coil and had his right leg badly squeezed before he could be released.

The two snakes were kept in the cage, looking out from the bars. The snakes are lively at the present time, having come out of their winter torpor. The arrival of warm weather of the eleven pythons some were swimming about in the two tanks and others were coiling in the cage. All day the snakes were from eight to twelve feet long.

Snyder was armed with a long syringe, filled with the deadly fluid. It was Shannon's duty to catch a python by the neck. Cook stood by the tail, so that the snake could not coil and attack them. Then Shannon would open the mouth with a stick, while Snyder forced the medicine down. After the snake was in Cook's hands, the keeper placed it in a gunnysack and tossed it to a corner, it being thought advisable to keep them covered until all had been given the medicine.

By the time that three of the snakes had been doctored, the others were growing excited. One python, a twelve-footer, two or three times slid down the trunk of the tree, striking at the intruders. Each time the snake was driven back, the python dropped suddenly from the tree and struck at Shannon, who dodged, and then rolled in the sand. Shannon, the only free man, dropped his syringe, grasping the tip of the snake's tail, strove to prevent the coils tightening. The three men's efforts told after a time, and slowly the python uncoiled. Then Snyder with a stick pried open the python's mouth, loosening the fangs from Cook's thumb.

The three men then rolled the python down the snake's throat, and placed him also in a gunnysack. The remaining snakes were easily captured and doctored. Cook's thumb was dressed by the park ambulance surgeon, Shannon's leg was bruised and almost broken by the clutch of the python's coils.

GERMANY AND MOROCCO.

Berlin, May 31.—A resolution adopted by the Pan-German Congress at Laubach declares "It is imperatively necessary for the political and business interests of the empire to acquire a foothold on the Atlantic coast region of Morocco, and the congress feels it to be a humiliating disregard of Germany's interests if the British fleet fixed the future of Morocco without consulting Germany, thus treating her like a power of third rank."
