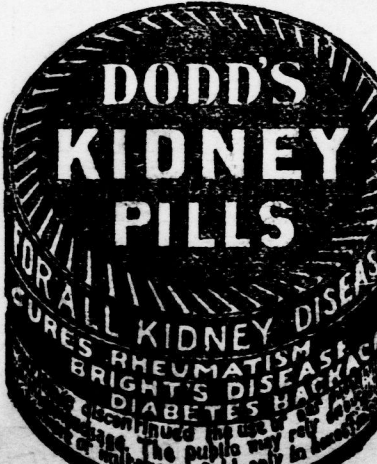
There will be another of those fashionable assemblies in the city hall tomorrow (Friday) evening. This will probably be the last of the season.

COMMITTEE MET, BUT DID LITTLE

Half a Dozen Schemes to Advise the City Were Not Acted Upon.

The manufacturers' committee met yesterday afternoon, Ald. Wyatt in the chair. The attendance was somewhat small, and several of those present questioned the advisability of calling a meeting if the members would not put in an appearance.

The committee considered half a dozen schemes which were submitted by tenderers to advertise the city so as to secure new industries, but in the end nothing was done. The committee, did, however, accept the tender of the Canada Press Bureau, of this city, to supply cuttings from Canadian papers containing references to industrial matters.

All items dealing with the movements of new and old industries will be clipped, and sent to Assessment Commissioner Grant, who will put himself in correspondence with those whom he believes might be induced to come to London.

The committee is also considering the advisability of advertising the city in American trade journals, and in the meantime the Canada Press Bureau is also to submit figures for supplying clippings from American publications.

All the other schemes which were proposed were laid over.

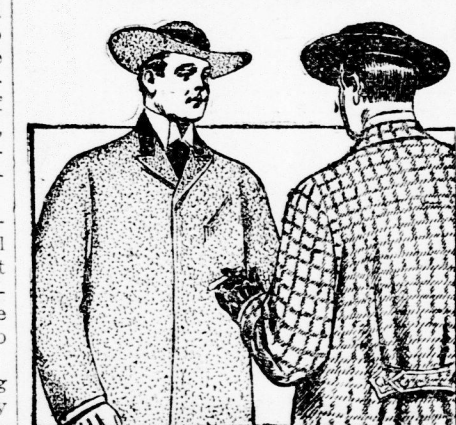
